DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Eli Ulery House is a two story, brick structure, Italianate in style. It is cubic in mass with a cubic cupola centered on a hipped roof. It has four double chimneys, two on the east side and two on the west side. Below the roof (which was replaced in 1978) are decorative brackets which provide the only divergence from the straight lines of the house.

There are six brackets on each facade beneath the eaves between which are situated small (2' x 3') attic windows - 5 on the front facade and 3 on the other facades. The four over four windows are adorned by simple limestone sills and lintels.

The cupola has a hipped roof decorated by double brackets under the eaves at the corners. The windows, here, are two over two and there are three to each side.

The house is four over four in floor plan with a central hallway. The two front rooms on the first floor contain marble fireplaces. The remaining six rooms each formerly contained a wooden fireplace. Five original fireplaces remain: one was covered; one was replaced; and one marble fireplace recently collapsed.

A one and a half story brick addition to the rear which housed a kitchen and small bedroom was removed during the early 1940's and replaced with a one story wooden addition which contains a bathroom and a porch.

There originally was an Italianate porch with a balcony on the front facade of the house. This was replaced during the 1920's and the door on the second story which led to the porch has been boarded up. There was also a second porch added to the west facade of the house, probably at the turn of the century, which has since been removed.

The major interior alteration occurred in the 1940's when plumbing was added to the dining room to convert it to a kitchen. The fireplace in that room was covered up as well at that time.

Other than that, no structural changes have occurred in the house and, since the house has been tuckpointed, recently, it is in basically good condition.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Eli Ulery House is significant for its associations with both its builder and his son, Eli S. Ulery, instrumental in the settlement and development of the area through their efforts in cattle ranching.

Eli Ulery came from Pennsylvania to Illinois in the 1830's as a cowboy and soon had acquired enough capital by 1851 to purchase his own stock business of 600 acres. As his holdings and wealth increased, he was able to construct the residence that is the subject of this nomination.

By the time of his death, in 1897, Ulery had acquired 1180 acres and had expanded his business to include horse raising and farming.

At his death, the ranch and farm passed into the possession of his son, Eli S. Ulery, who further expanded the horse raising business and farming operation. He, too, was a prominent county resident. One county-wide contribution of the son was to purchase 40 acres for a Chautauqua park (not a part of this nomination) that included a man-made lake, pavilion and several summer cabins. The park land is located just south of the Ulery farm land.

Eli Ulery continued to utilize the land for farming and ranching until 1921 when he committed suicide at the home of one of his sons.

The farm remained in the Ulery family until 1932 when it was sold to Grover C. Patton of Decatur. This family still retains ownership of the farmhouse and 200 acres.

The Eli Ulery House is significant for its associations with both its builder and his son, Eli S. Ulery, instrumental in the settlement and development of the area through their efforts in cattle ranching.

Eli Ulery came from Pennsylvania to Illinois in the 1830's, where he began "buying, feeding and driving cattle to the Eastern markets, without permanently locating at any point".¹ He continued these activities for a number of years. In 1851 he married and thereupon purchased 600 acres of land in Mt. Zion Township, where he established his permanent residence. As his holdings and wealth increased, he was able to construct the residence that is the subject of this nomination.

At that period, central Illinois had the highest concentration of beef cattle (between 3 and 4.7 per 100 acres, depending on the county) in the state. Several individuals were outstanding in the size of their herds and the extent of their business. Among them were John D. Gillette and Samuel Funk of Logan County and B. F. Harris of Champaign County. Harris' farm extended over 4,000 acres and therefore was a much larger operation than the Ulery farm. According to one study of the industry "Besides such well known men (as Funk, Harris and Gillette). . . many smaller scale operators, to a certain extent influenced by these leaders were the real backbone of the cattle feeding business".² The History of Macon County, Illinois, in the section on Mt. Zion Township mentions Eli Ulery, by name, as a dealer in and shipper of stock and states that "The stock of the township now comprises many of the best breeds and much attention is paid to stock raising by farmers".

Eli Ulery then, though not one of the biggest producers of beef, did figure prominently in the industry in Macon County at a time when cattle raising was one of the most important contributors to the economy of central Illinois. By the time of his death, in 1897, Ulery had acquired 1180 acres and had expanded his business to include horse raising and farming.

At his death, the ranch and farm passed into the possession of his son, Eli S. Ulery, who further expanded the horse raising business and farming operation. He, too, was a prominent county resident. One county-wide contribution of the son was to purchase 40 acres for a Chautauqua park (not a part of this nomination) that included a man-made lake, pavilion and several summer cabins. The park land is located just south of the Ulery farm land.

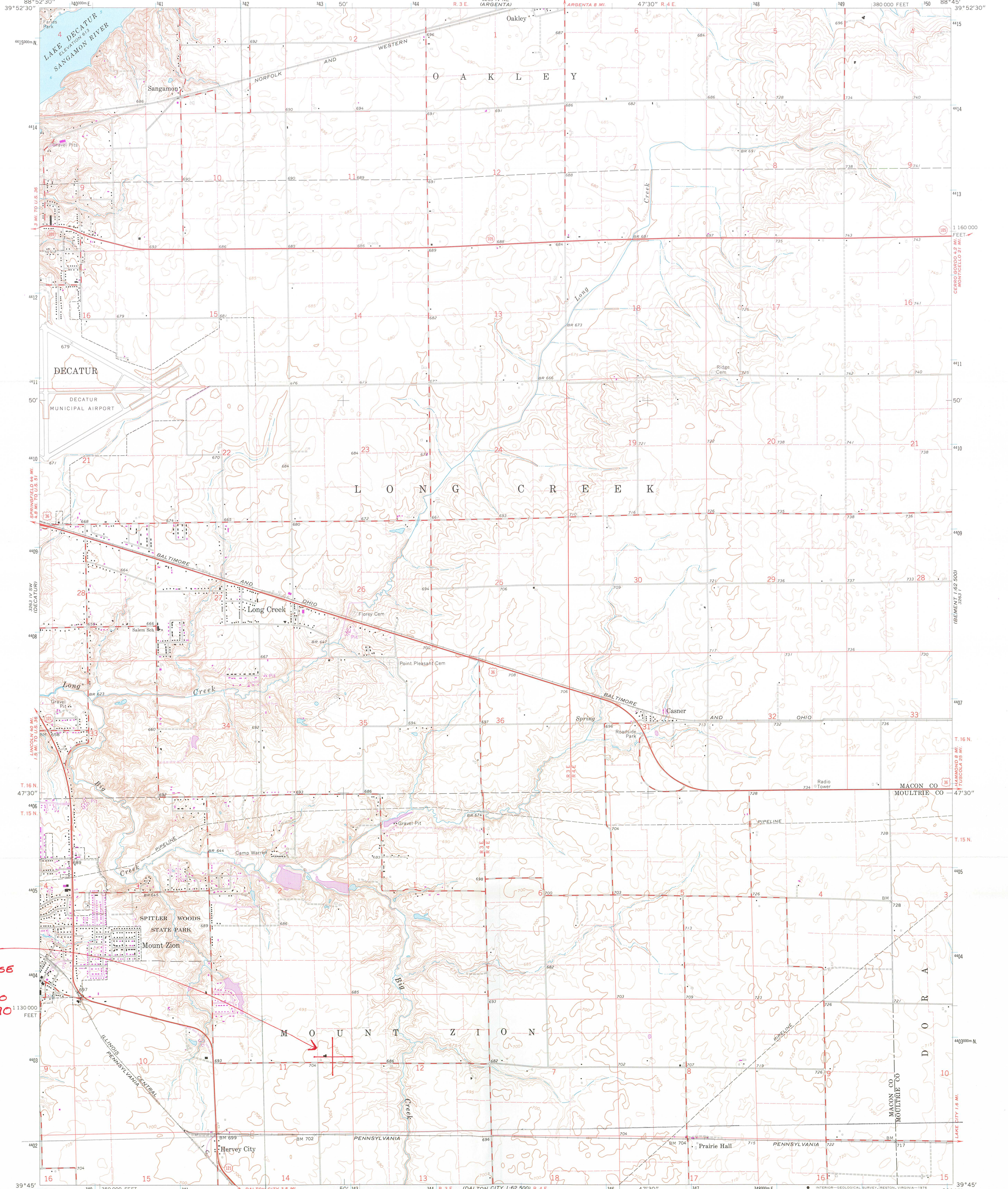

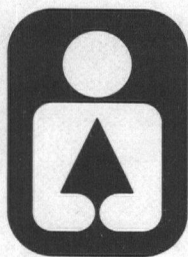

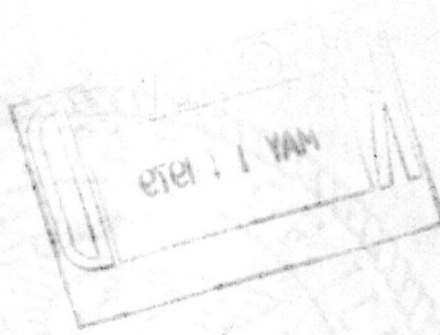
