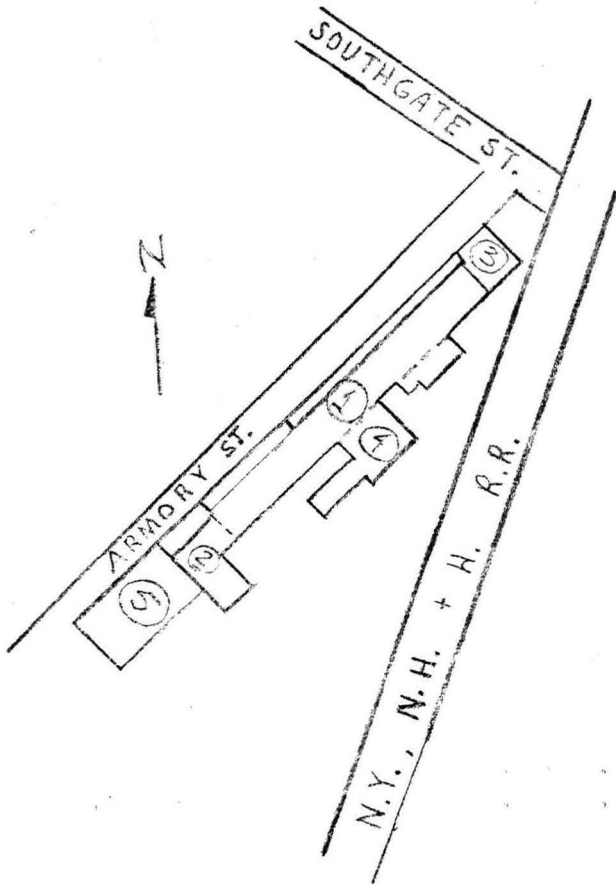

9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

Built in 1854, the main body of the Lower Junction Shop (section #1 on map--see reverse) is two stories high, 400 feet long and 40 feet wide. Constructed of stone chips covered with stucco, the building is enclosed by a pitched roof with evenly spaced dormers. The building is constructed of repeating bays of equal size, each of which contains a single 12/12 window at both stories. At the building's south end (section #2 on map) is an early addition, probably pre-dating 1860; this section is of the same design as the earlier building, except that it stands on a high basement and is constructed of coursed rubble. Later additions include a two-storey brick wing with pitched roof (section #4) built between 1860 and 1870, a two-storey brick office with flat roof built between 1911 and 1912 (section #3), a four-storey brick loft building with flat roof (section #5) built after 1922 and a one-storey concrete-block shed (section #6) added to the mill's west wall in the mid-twentieth century.

First known as the Lower (or South) Junction Shop, this mill was built by Eli Thayer, an active abolitionist, founder of the "Free Emigrant Society" (to secure Kansas's entry to the Union as a free state), Founder of the Oread Collegiate Institute (for women--1849), Congressman and important local real estate developer. Following the architectural model of the Junction Shop (Form 142-B), Thayer may have rented manufacturing space in the Lower Junction Shop until 1859 when he sold the building to Mr. Freeman of New York and B. F. Joslyn, an inventor and gun manufacturer, who had had business connections with Thayer at least as early as 1856. (cont.)

9. Joslyn and Freeman began manufacturing pistols (patented by Joslyn) here in 1859; in 1860 and 1861, the firm made Joslyn's breech-loading carbines for the War Department, receiving "the largest single order for fire-arms ever given to one contractor in the country." Known during this period as the Joslyn Pistol Manufactory, the Lower Junction Shop was briefly called the Pistol Shop Barracks in 1861-1862 when part or all of the structure was used as a soldiers' barracks.

In 1863, the mill building was purchased by Jordan Marsh & Co. of Boston, which converted it into a woolen mill, made "extensive improvements," and re-named it the Adriatic Mill. The building's second storey contained carding and spinning operations, while finishing and weaving were carried out on the first storey; all equipment used in the mill was produced by Worcester machinery manufacturers.

From 1881 until the 1920s, the mill was owned by the Worcester Woolen Company, which had been founded by James and John Legg (see Form 141-B-1 for biographical information). This firm made "fine woolens, cassimers and suitings" producing between five and eight thousand yards of cloth per week.

The second oldest mill building extant in Worcester, the Lower Junction Shop preserves most of its original design and (together with the Junction Shop) is the most significant remnant of Worcester's early industrial development.

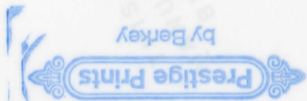
