DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The St. John's Church Historic District contains the oldest frame structure as well as some of the oldest brick houses in Richmond. The land generally bounded by 22nd Street on the west, Marshall Street on the north, East Franklin Street on the south, and 29th Street on the east, is known as Church Hill, but the small neighborhood surrounding the park on the eastern end is sometimes referred to as Libby Hill. The area south and west of Broad and 25th Streets is within the original grid plan of the town of Richmond, laid out by William Byrd in 1737. The steep slopes to the south, east and west form the natural boundaries of Church Hill, but on the north the flat plain continues, becoming Union Hill.

The existing architecture in the St. John's Church Historic District is almost exclusively of the "side hall" townhouse plan, the larger houses having disappeared. Those buildings in the block bounded by East Broad, East Grace, 23rd and 24th Streets, known as the Carrington block, provide examples of most styles represented within the historic district, and, indeed, the entire city. The pre-1816 brick houses at 2302 (Hilary Baker House), and 2306 (Ann Adams Carrington House) East Grace Street, display Flemish bond brickwork on the front facades, brick corbeled cornices and plaster flat arches typical of the Federal period; the bow projection and the three-sectioned window on the Carrington House are reminiscent of larger houses that traditionally have been attributed to Robert Mills, on Capitol Hill, further west. The city's oldest existing row house, 2307-09-11 East Broad Street, is Carrington Row, built in 1818. Its Neo-Classical feeling is created by the stuccoed brick facade with its pilaster motif and recessed panels and arches. The Greek Revival Hardgrove House, 2300 East Franklin Street, was built in 1849; its three-story townhouse facade is embellished with a typical Greek Doric porch, granite porch steps and window lintels set on a facade of mechanically-bonded brick veneer. The post-War, two-story row between and including 2308 and 2316 East Grace Street has full-length porches in both iron and wood, presenting the range of decorative detailing possible in the two materials. The Carrington block has the most intensive contrasts in styles of the entire area and has received the most attention from Historic Richmond Foundation.

Other important areas within the district include the 2600 block of East Franklin Street, where Greek Revival houses of the 1840's and '50's predominate. Three brick buildings, formerly located on 2nd and 3rd Streets and slated for demolition, were dismantled and rebuilt on Church Hill, in the 2600 block of East Franklin Street. Notable individual buildings in the district are the brick Adams Double House (1809-10), 2501-03 East Grace Street; the frame John Morris Cottages (1830, 1835, respectively), 2500 East Grace Street and 207 North 25th Street; the Gentry-Stokes-Crew House (1839), 2718 East Franklin Street; and the deteriorating but still impressive White-Taylor House (1839), 2717 East Grace Street.

These and other valuable structures are scattered among less imposing houses which nonetheless are similar in materials, scale, color and style. Street grading has exaggerated the existing slopes in many cases,

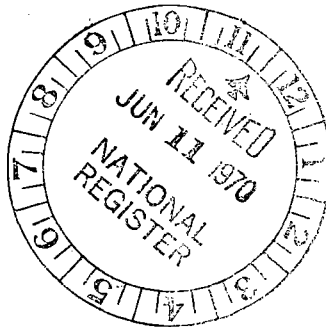

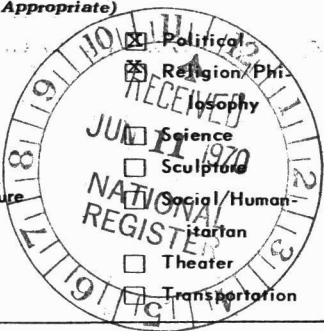

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Although the first building on Church Hill was the present transept of St. John's Church, that building did not give its name to the neighborhood that slowly grew up around it until the nineteenth century. The area was first known as Indian Hill and later Richmond Hill. The Libby Hill section owes its name to Luther Libby, whose house at 1 North 29th Street faced the present park; his warehouse, to the south along the river, at the corner of 20th and East Cary Streets, became the well-known Libby Prison of Civil War days.

Settlement around St. John's Church was extremely slow, due to difficulty in scaling the ungraded slopes surrounding the hill in the early days, and to the natural growth of the city to the west. Most of the residents were merchants whose stores and factories were conveniently located in Shockoe Valley below, or along the James River. The 1861 Turpin and Yarbrough Houses at 2209 and 2215 East Broad Street, and the 1849 Hardgrove House at 2300 East Grace Street were owned by tobacco manufactures. Yarbrough's factory still stands at the southwest corner of 25th and East Franklin Streets, within the borders of the District. Historically, Church Hill's most significant structure is St. John's Church, the site for the Virginia Convention of 1775, where Patrick Henry delivered his "Liberty or Death" speech. The burial ground surrounding the church was the main graveyard in Richmond until the opening of Shockoe Cemetery in 1825.

By the 1890's and early-1900's, the pull westward was too strong for many of the residents of Church Hill, and they left their homes for more fashionable areas. The neighborhood deteriorated for fifty years until preservation-minded citizens began to look toward revitalization of Church Hill. In 1956, Historic Richmond Foundation was established, and, as a result of its efforts, the city passed an Ordinance in 1957 establishing the St. John's Church Historic District. This zone has been expanded twice since then.

One of the oldest neighborhoods in Richmond, Church Hill is a fascinating textbook of nineteenth-century architectural styles. Aside from the dominant frame mass of St. John's Church at the peak of the hill, the design elements range from the compact proportions of a brick Federalist house to the intricate iron tracery of late-nineteenth century Victorian porches. Although most blocks have been filled in completely by townhouses, dramatic vistas remain across rooftops with the downtown skyline as a

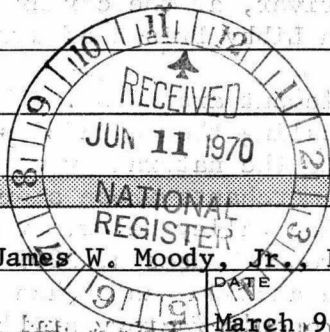

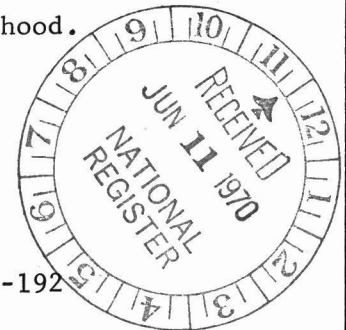

7. and has created a setting that enhances the visual impact of rows of houses, especially along North 25th Street and the 2200 block of East Broad Street. The much-repaired, high brick retaining walls around St. John's Church, granite curbing, brick sidewalks and cobblestone paving on some side streets enhance the nineteenth-century atmosphere. Open spaces exist in the burial grounds surrounding St. John's Church, the park in Libby Hill, the Mews created along the alley in the Carrington Block, and the open vista of the Richmond skyline seen from Philip Johnson's new WRVA Radio Station just beyond the western border of the Historic District. The Patrick Henry Park has replaced a row of commercial structures that once faced St. John's Church in the 2400 block of East Broad Street, while a one-story brick fire station stands on the site of residential structures at the northwest corner of 24th and East Broad Streets.
