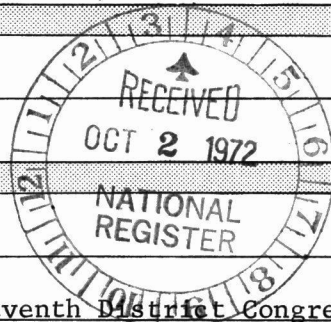

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

I. General Statement

A. Architectural Character: Although this is a typical medium-size early-nineteenth-century Valley townhouse, the facade was extensively remodelled in the early twentieth century.

II. Description of Exterior

A. Overall appearance: This is a two-story, four-bay house (originally four bays on the first floor and three on the second floor) with a full English basement. A two-story ell with English basement is attached at the north side of the building.

B. Foundations: Stone, now covered with brick on the facade.

C. Wall construction, Finish and Color: The front section is brick. The side walls are laid in Flemish bond, but the facade is laid in American bond and painted red. This, with the absence of scars after all the changes in fenestration, would seem to indicate that the facade has been completely rebuilt. The ell is random rubble limestone.

D. Chimneys: There are two brick interior-end chimneys with simple corbelled caps on the front section. The interior side chimney in the ell has a brick stack and corbelled cap.

E. Openings:

1. Doorways and Doors: A center bay doorway with architrave trim, a stone lintel and double doors opens on the ground level. The original doors were in the east bay on the first floor, and in the west bay on the ground level leading into the basement.
2. Windows: Wooden six-over-six double-hung windows with stone lintels, sills, and architrave trim.

F. Roof: The gable roof has a large off center cross gable becoming an engaged pediment with a modillion cornice. A circular window is centered in the pediment. The original steeply pitched gable roof can still be detected in the side elevation.

III. Description of the Interior

A. Floor plans: A wide stair leads from the small entrance vestibule on the ground floor to the cross hall on the first floor. The parlor opens off the cross hall, and the stairs ascend from the hall. Another hall leads back into the ell from the cross hall. The second floor has a cross hall and four large rooms. The original entrance was on the east end of the first floor, and the parlor opened off the entrance vestibule, as well as having a door into the hall. The dining room was entered either from the doorway under the stair or the doorway in the ell hall, as it is now.

B. Stairway: The stair is a narrow single-run open-string stair with a vertically panelled dado and stair spandrel.

C. Wall and ceiling Finish: Painted plaster, hall ceiling is acoustic tile.

D. Doorways and Doors: Panelled doors have plain trim with corner blocks.

E. Heating: There are fireplaces in every room with plain mantels of the mid-nineteenth century on the first floor. Those on the second floor are more elaborate and appear to be contemporary with the construction of the house. The house is now heated by central heating.

IV. Site: The house sits on the north side of Washington Street about one half block east of Main Street, and opposite the Court House.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

SEE INSTRUCTIONS

This simple Lexington town house assumes importance because of its connection with Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson. It is the only house Jackson ever owned, and he lived here with his wife, Anna Morrison, from 1858-1861. With the outbreak of the War Between the States, Jackson left his Lexington home to accept a colonelcy with a Virginia regiment, and to go on to subsequent reknown as a general in the Army of Northern Virginia. He returned to Lexington only to be buried.

The house was built on the northern half of lot 13 for William Tidd or Cornelius Dorman about 1801; the stone ell is believed to have been constructed before the brick front. Archibald Graham sold the house to Jackson in 1858. Although, Mrs. Jackson retained ownership of the house until 1904, she did not live there after Jackson left Lexington. In 1904 the United Daughters of the Confederacy bought the property to be used as a hospital dedicated to Jackson. It began full operation on an all season basis in 1911, and continued in this capacity until 1953. In 1954 Jay Johns founder of the Lee-Jackson Memorial, Inc., purchased the house and established it as an historic house museum and memorial to Jackson.

# The Foundation



Six years ago, Historic Lexington Foundation published Preservation 1975, a booklet which traced the work of HLF from 1966 to 1975. The principal activity of the Foundation during its first nine years was the purchase and sale of a number of key buildings along North Main Street. A "revolving fund", developed through generous gifts to the Foundation, made this possible.

During the Mid 1970's, with most of the buildings in the "pilot block" rehabilitated and returned to their earlier usefulness or to a new adaptable one, HFL turned its attention to the Stonewall Jackson House which was owned by the Lee-Jackson Foundation of Charlottesville. This structure, key to the entire downtown effort, was being managed by HLF under a two year contract with Lee-Jackson.

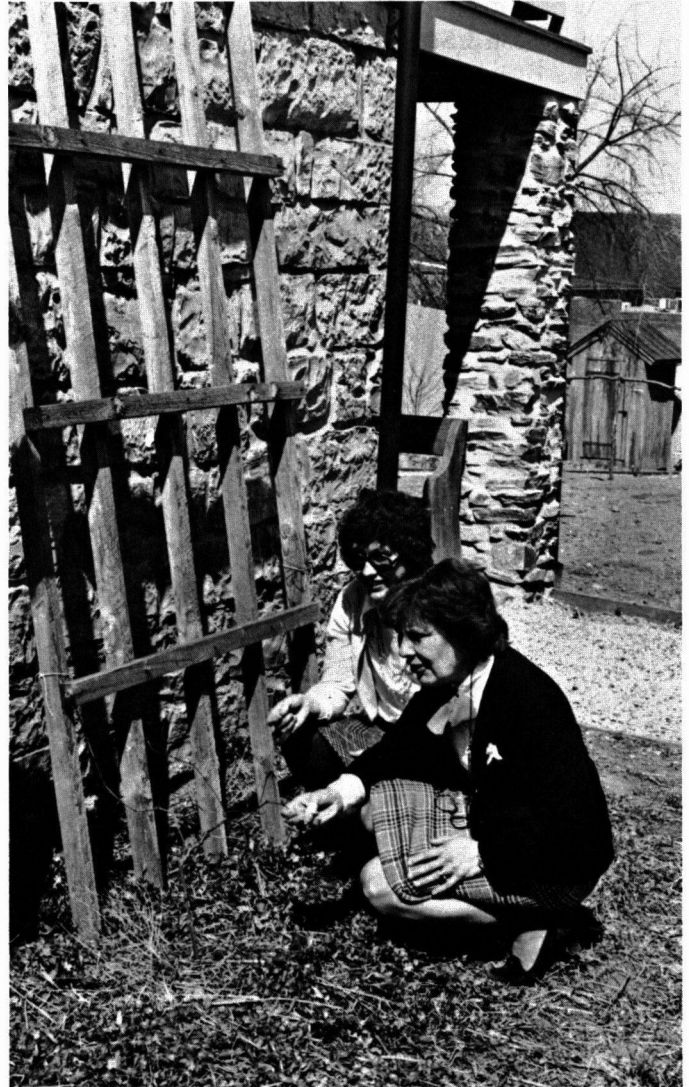
In 1976 HLF entered into an agreement with Lee-Jackson Foundation whereby HLF would accept the building and also accept the responsibility to raise the necessary funds to restore the building and to reopen it for visitors.

This publication, The Stonewall Jackson House Restoration Report 1976-81, is devoted almost entirely to the tremendous work that went into this effort. The house was reopened on October 19, 1979, at a gala affair attended by Jackson's granddaughter, Mrs. Julia Preston, and other members of the family.

Also in this issue we give grateful thanks to the some 1600 contributors who made the effort possible. The Jackson House has now taken its place as the focal point of downtown Lexington's tourist activity. But the job is not completed. Much remains to be done as HLF continues to work toward the attractiveness and the economic health of downtown Lexington.

## HLF Finances

In December 1974, Historic Lexington Foundation listed its net assets as \$91,000. It held property and securities worth \$144,000 and it had a loan of \$50,000.

As of June 30, 1981, HLF lists its total assets at \$631,777, which consists of the permanent investment in the Stonewall Jackson House and property of \$411,000 and of the extensive collections and furnishings of \$113,000.

This represents a sizable increase in six and one-half years. Elsewhere in this booklet are listed the names of those who made this all possible.

## Foundation Eyes its Future Role

With the Stonewall Jackson House, its garden and its shop, now going full steam ahead, Historic Lexington Foundation looks to the future of downtown Lexington. The following objectives continue to be clearly before us:

—To work for the completion of the exterior of the pilot block, that area bounded by Main, Washington, Randolph, and Henry Streets, with regard to facade restoration, sidewalks, signs, lighting and landscaping.

—To identify other property and areas which should be restored through the Historic Lexington Foundation and its revolving fund.

—To continue to acquire facade easements throughout the community on structures of architectural and historic importance.

—To work with governmental bodies to protect historic property through legislation, planning, and preservation programs.

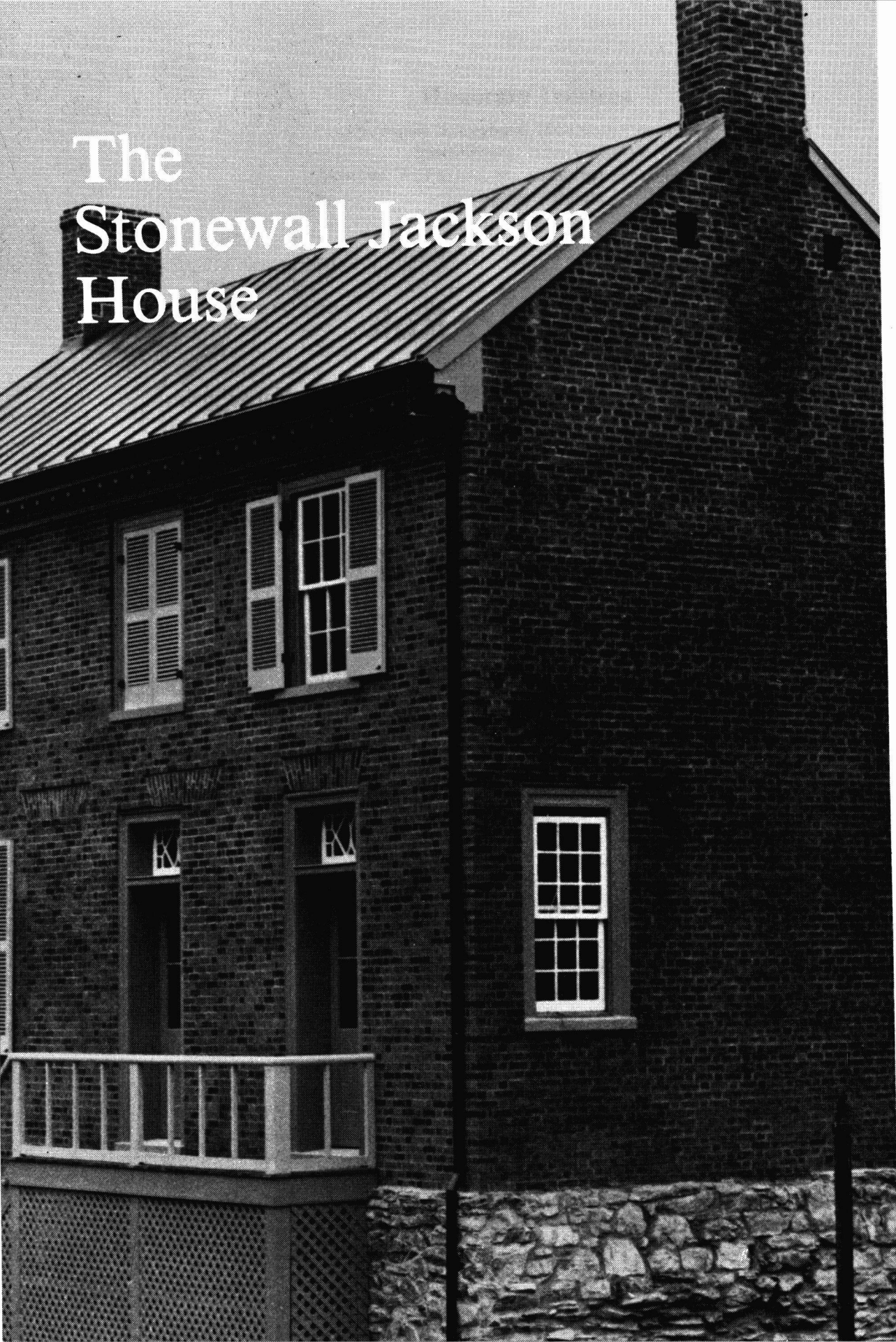
—To encourage individuals, businesses, the colleges, the City and the County to guard and landscape open spaces and areas adjacent to and within the City.

# Restoration Report

In October of 1979, Historic Lexington Foundation marked an achievement with the dedication and opening of the Stonewall Jackson House. Prior to this time, the trustees of the HLF were responsible for the operation of the house under contract from Lee-Jackson Memorial of Charlottesville who had been responsible for early preservation efforts.

HLF undertook the task of removing twentieth century additions to the Jackson House and of restoring the adjacent Davidson-Tucker House to its original state. In time HLF acquired the title, along with a challenge matching grant from Lee-Jackson and began restoring the original building. Today the Jackson House is a documented historic house museum which is listed in the National Register of Historic Places and is open to visitors daily.

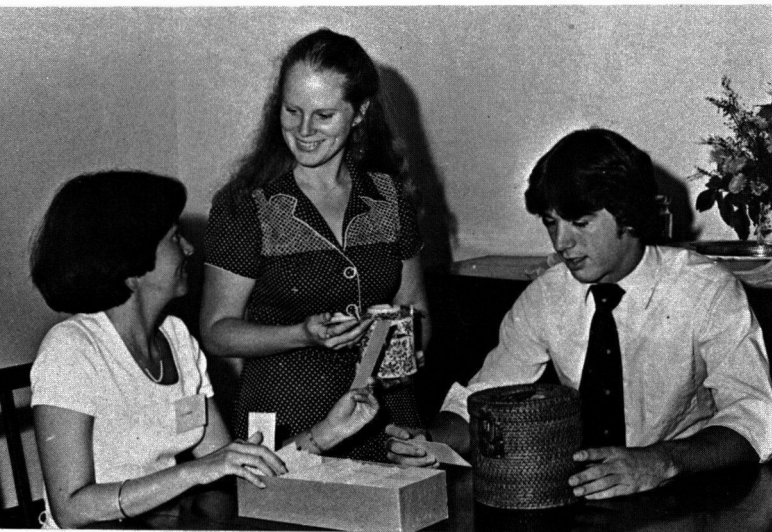


# The Collections

The furnishings of the exhibition rooms comprise the most valuable part of the collections of the Jackson House. Important among them are numerous items of furniture that Jackson himself owned and used while living in the house from 1859 to 1861. In the collection are also a number of valuable older prints, photographs, daguerreotypes, ambrotypes, and oil paintings, including two of the six known original images of Jackson, and a portrait of Jackson by William Garl Brown, c. 1869.

At the present time the staff is cataloguing, researching, and documenting current as well as recent gifts to the collection which, with their authentic setting in the house, offer a valid interpretation of an important American hero, of the community in which he lived, and of significant aspects of Southern life. All of this was made possible by the generosity of many donors including the Jackson family.

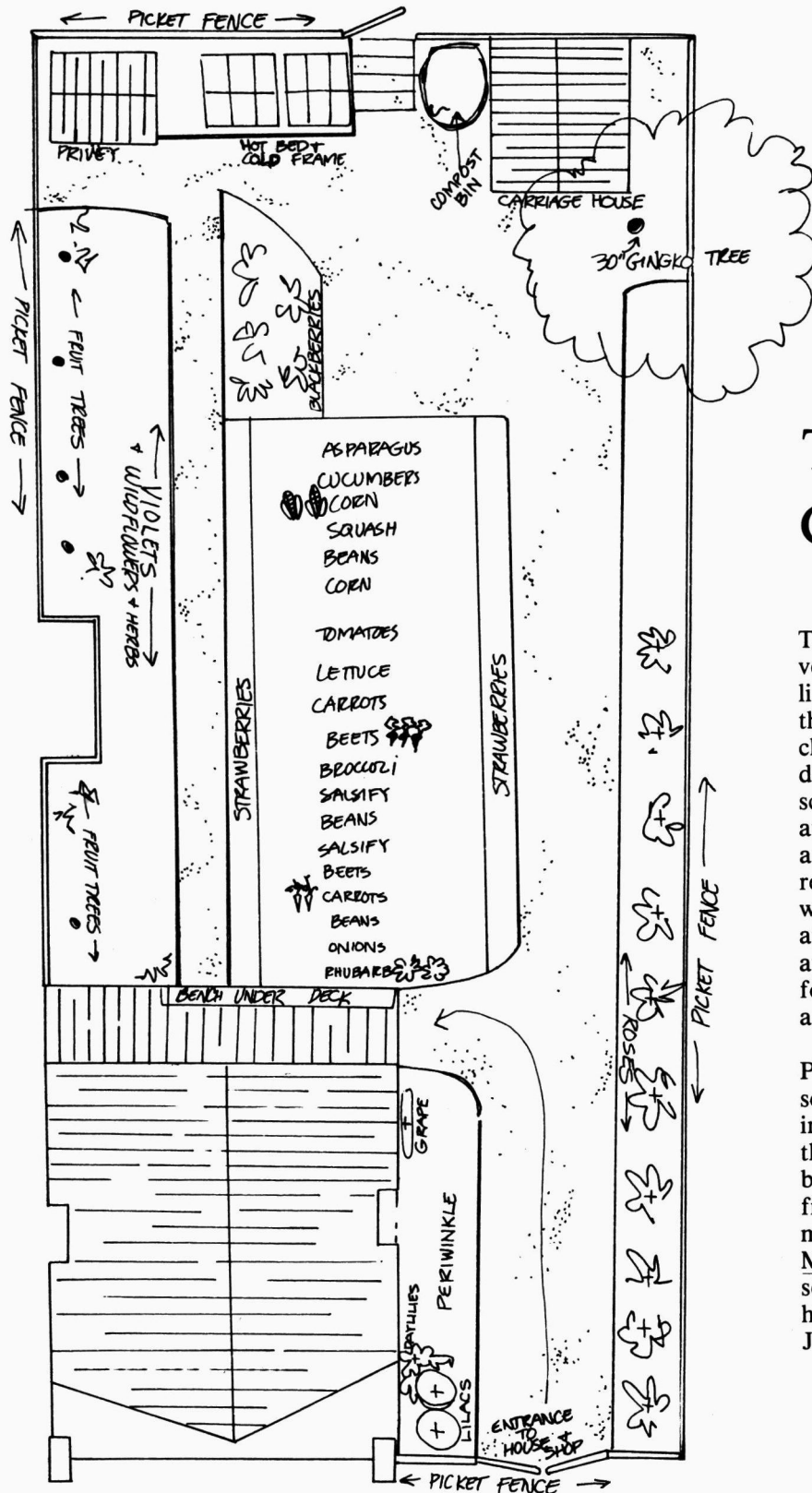

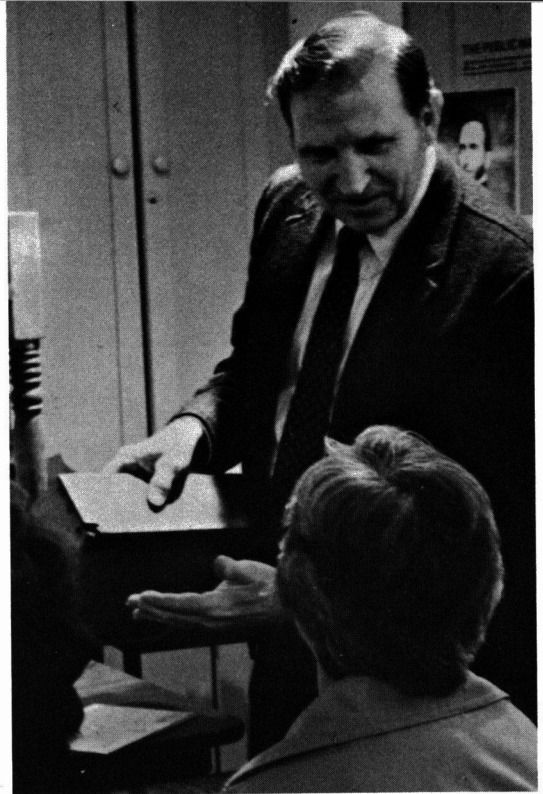
## The Garden

The garden is becoming an important vehicle for interpreting mid-19th century life to Jackson House visitors. Based on the original yard plan by restoration architect Milton Grigg, the garden plan was developed with the consultation of landscape architect Rudy J. Favretti, a leading authority of historical gardens. Instead of a formal garden, the restoration represents a typical backyard garden in which the owners grew fruit, vegetables, and flowers for their own use. The restoration includes a hot bed and a cold frame for starting seedlings, a compost bin, and a raised bed for vegetables.

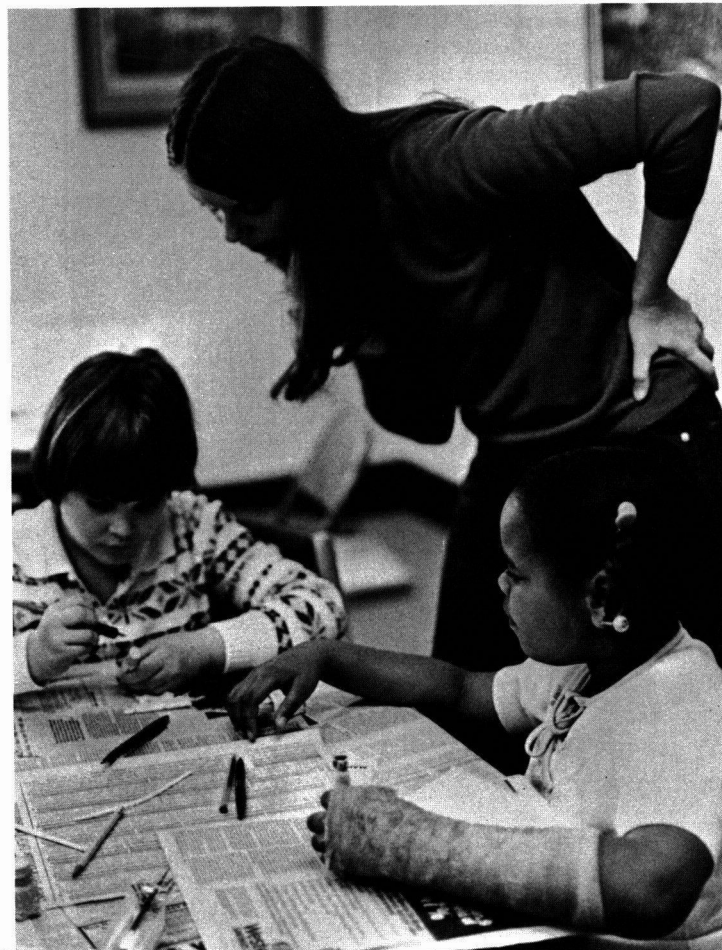
Plants for the garden have been carefully selected from varieties that were available in the United States by 1850, and many of them, including some rare old roses, have been donated to the restoration. Excerpts from Jackson's correspondence, comments from Mary Anna Jackson's *Memoirs*, and marginal notes in Jackson's copy of *Buist's Kitchen Gardener*, have provided clues to the plants that Jackson favored.

## Educational Activities

In its first year and a half of operation HLF has presented a variety of educational programs and workshops under the direction of the Jackson House staff. Activities have included a series of parent/child workshops on traditional crafts, a series of lectures on conservation of furniture, books, paper, paintings, and prints, and an interior preservation seminar for homeowners. HLF, under a grant from the Virginia Foundation for Humanities and Public Policy, cosponsored a state-wide workshop on the interpretation of historic sites with the Virginia History and Museums Foundation. HLF and the George C. Marshall Research Foundation were hosts for the regional meeting of the Virginia Association of Museums. With the Historic House Association of America, the Jackson House sponsored a seminar on rehabilitating and maintaining energy-efficient old homes. At the present time, the staff of the Jackson House is developing additional educational programs that will complement and enrich the existing history programs at the public schools.

# Grant Report

Historic Lexington Foundation has been extremely fortunate to receive a number of grants from state and federal agencies which have helped support the foundation's publications and programs, as well as the restoration and operation of Stonewall Jackson House.

In 1978 the restoration of Jackson House was supported by a \$1,000 Consultant Services Grant from the National Trust for Historic Preservation and a \$20,000 grant from the Virginia Historic Landmarks Commission.

In 1979 the NEH granted \$6,886 for development of the interpretive program and docent training materials for Jackson House and a matching grant from the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities and Public Policy provided \$900 for a workshop on Interpretation of Historic Sites, sponsored jointly by HLF and the Virginia History and Museums Federation.

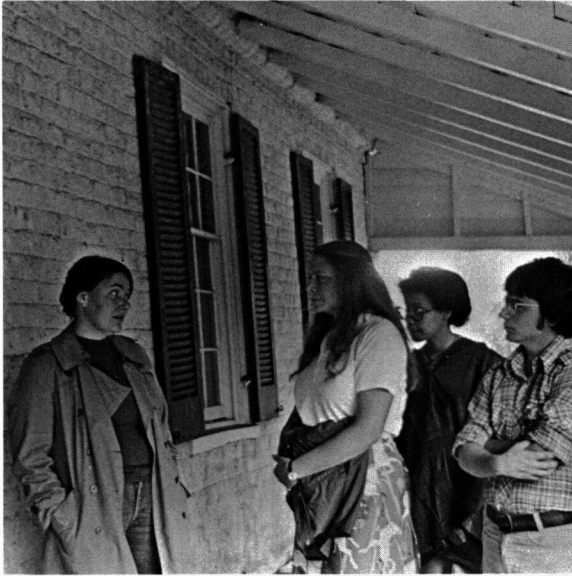
An Institute of Museum Services grant in 1980 provided \$11,150 for the general operations of Jackson House, and an award from the Virginia Legislature through the Virginia Historic Landmarks Commission, has provided \$15,000 a year for the past two years, for maintenance and operations.

In October of 1980 the National Endowment for the Humanities awarded a \$45,000 challenge grant to the Foundation for Stonewall Jackson House development. Under the terms of the grant, HLF is charged with raising \$135,000 of matching funds, or \$3 for every \$1 contributed by the Endowment, within a three year period. By July of 1981, HLF had met the challenge for the first third of the award. This most recent grant from the Endowment has encouraged new donors and has provided an incentive for previous donors to increase their gift.

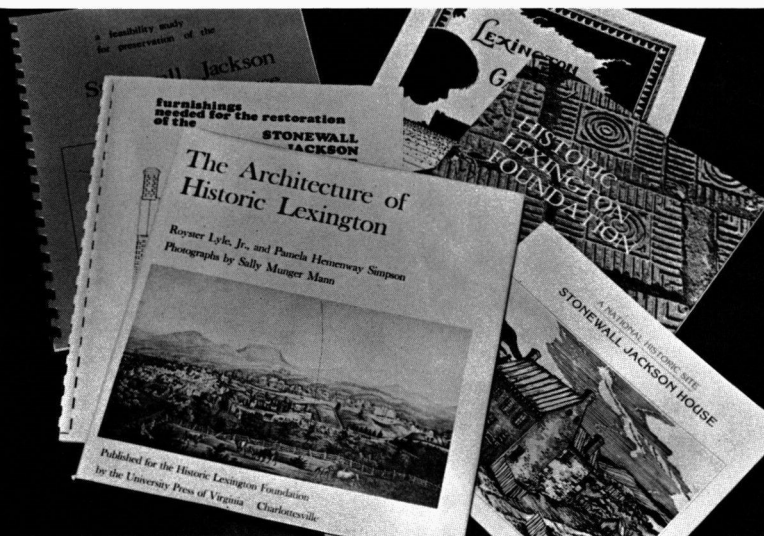


*William Moore, Director of the Greensboro Historical Museum, discusses the role of the museum community in Lexington with the Jackson House docents and representatives of other museums.*

The Center, a gift of the Honorable Elmon T. Gray of Waverly, Virginia, in memory of his father, State Senator Garland Gray, is housed on the third floor of the Jackson House. Long-range plans for the Center include a public lecture series, and conferences for scholars active in research and publication in Civil War and Southern history. The Center

has already begun a pilot program of college internships. Students from colleges have earned academic credit while making some important contributions to the Jackson House. The student's interests have covered a wide range of activities: pottery shard identification, accessioning and cataloguing items in the collection, museum exhibitions techniques, and merchandising. Research papers have covered topics such as Jackson's slaves, Victorian wallpaper, and nineteenth century floorcoverings and furnishings.

Historic Lexington Foundation and the Jackson House have already been involved in the publication of a variety of items, and will continue to develop this area of education. Already in print are the Architecture of Historic Lexington, The Stonewall Jackson House: A National Historic Site, and several smaller booklets and pamphlets. Soon to be published is the genealogy of the Jackson, Junkin, and Morrison families.

# The Volunteer Docent Program

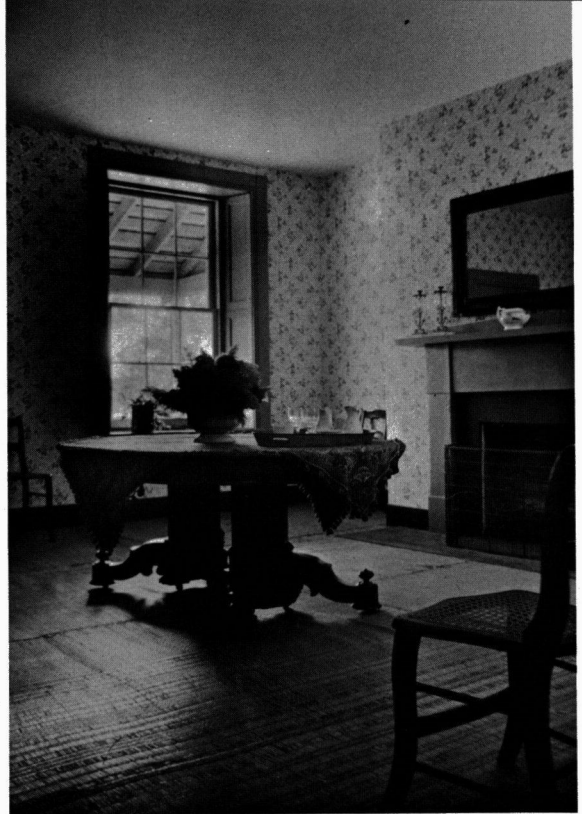
**T**he volunteer docent program that began in 1979 with the recruiting and training of a core group of 15 individuals, has today become an integral part of the daily operation of the Jackson House. The training program, funded by a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, consisted of series of seminars, speakers, and field trips. Ongoing training includes regular docent meetings, evaluations, and a speaker series. Today there are over 34 docents who specialize in services such as gardening, collections repair, craft demonstrations, flower-arranging, and merchandising in addition to providing tours for visitors.

As a result of the dedication and commitment of the docents, the Jackson House is able to fulfill the goals of its interpretative program: to show the development of character and leadership qualities in Jackson as a professor, citizen, church leader, and family man in the decade he lived in Lexington, 1851-61.

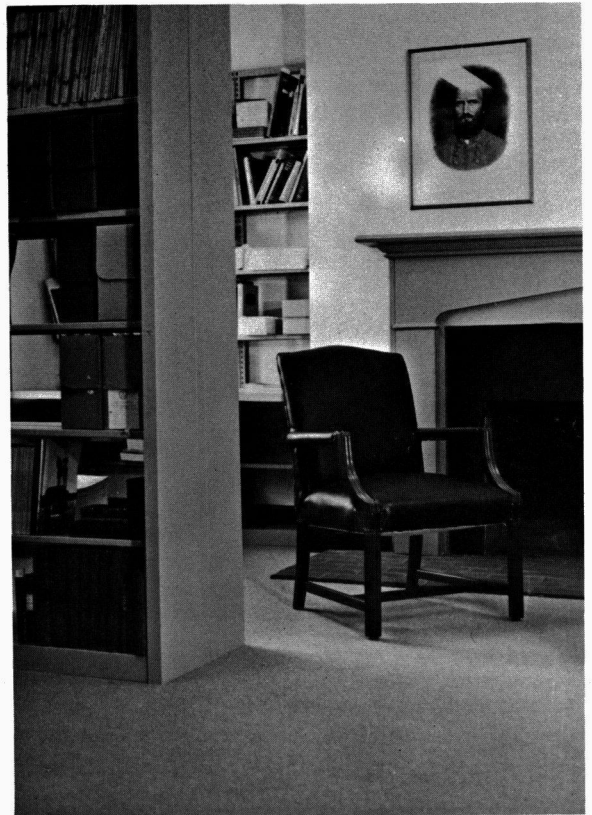

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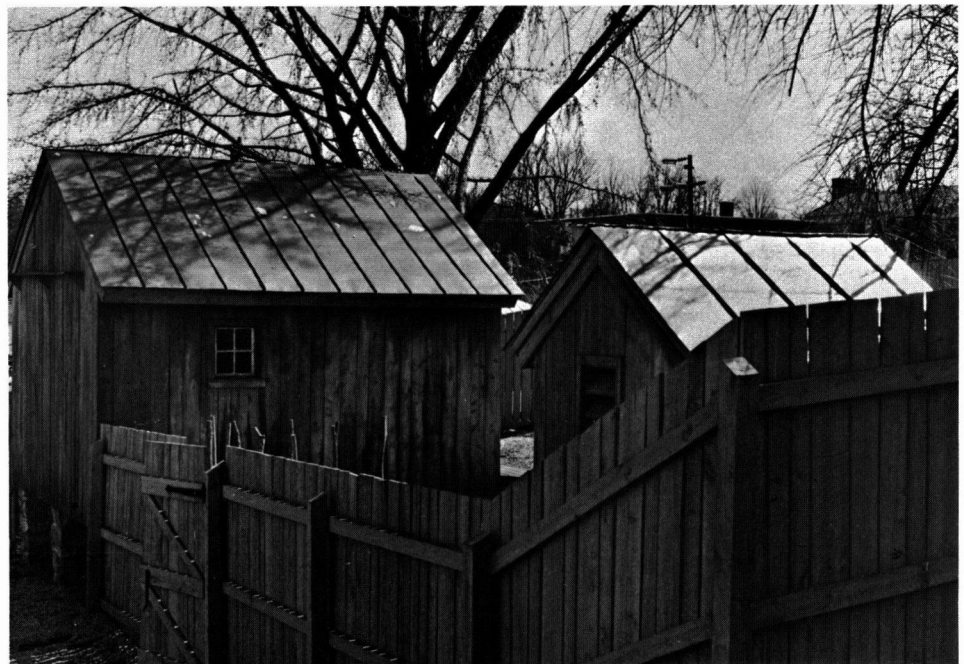
