DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Kittiewan is a flat, open tract of farmland occupying part of a peninsula on the north side of the James River. The mid-18th-century dwelling house at Kittiewan is a story-and-a-half, five-bay frame structure with an original gable-roofed ell at the east and a later lean-to ell stretching across the remainder of the rear (north) side of the house. The main block and original ell are set upon an English-bond foundation and are clad with beaded weatherboards into which are driven early shutter dogs. The windows have 9/9 Federal-era sash, except for one original 9-light sash in the ell. Two small windows light gable-end closets in each end of the main house; those on the west are covered by louvred blinds which may be original. Five pedimented dormers with flush-boarded tympana, 6/6 Federal sash, and beaded weatherboards on their cheeks break the front slope of the main block, and one similar dormer occupies each plane of the ell roof. The main block is crowned by interior end chimneys, of which the east stack has been rebuilt. The ell is served by an exterior English-bond brick chimney with two sets of tiled weatherings.

The lean-to ell, which in its present form dates from a post-1846 renovation, is covered with beaded weatherboards and has large 6/6 window sash. When this section was remodeled, porches were added to the front and rear of the house. These have low pedimented roofs supported on four tall truncated pyramidal piers. On the front porch, only those piers against the house are the originals.

The house is presently a modified double-pile, central-passage-plan structure. There is one room to either side of the passage in the front and a large dining room to the west of the rear passage. To the east, a kitchen intervenes between the passage and the original ell. The house was originally a single-pile, central-passage building with a single-room ell. Another ell--the northwest dining room--was apparently built early in the 19th century with the first ell being enlarged at the same time, creating a U-shaped house with an open "alley" between the two ells. The narrow alley between the two was converted to a passage in the post-1846 renovation, and the roof of all but the earliest portion of the ell was changed to its present shed form.

The original house contains a considerable amount of interior decoration; that in the parlor (southeast room) is the most elaborate. All four walls are fully sheathed with raised paneling capped by a dentil cornice and broken by a double-tiered chair rail. The chimney wall, which contains round-headed closets at either side of the fireplace, is punctuated by a series of four fluted Roman Doric pilasters flanking the closets. A striking late 18th-century mantel, consisting of fluted Roman Doric pilasters supporting a boldly and sharply molded entablature with a squat pulvinated frieze and a narrow central keystone, replaces the original architrave surround. Fluted Roman Doric pilasters flank the door to the passage as well.

The passage is treated with raised-panel wainscoting having an extra, low tier of panels above the symmetrical chair rail. The same sort of chair rail is carried up the open-string, triple-run stair. The latter substitutes a set of winders for the first landing and has a raised-panel soffit as well as a square newel, molded rail, and two symmetrical turned balusters to a tread.

7. DESCRIPTION

The same type of wainscoting as in the passage is used in the smaller west chamber in conjunction with a paneled room end. The end closets were opened up as niches by cutting large round-headed arches in the paneling in the mid-19th century. There is a mantel like that in the parlor, and a molded cornice is carried around the room.

In the ell, the fireplace is treated with a plain architrave surround, a raised-panel frieze, and a heavy unsupported shelf. This is the only decoration except for a chair board.

There is no decoration of note in the mid-19th-century ell, except for two built-in corner cupboards in the passage.

No early outbuildings survive. However, archaeological remains of the outbuildings most likely exist in the immediate vicinity, and the boundaries have been drawn to include them as well as the terraced bank to the creek, an original landscaping feature. Archaeological examination of the property could yield additional information on colonial Virginia plantation life.

BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

The boundaries have been drawn to include part of the open land immediately around the house. This area probably contains the archaeological remains of the original outbuildings. The boundaries extend immediately to the south of the house to include the terraced banks and the marshes in order to provide the house with a view to the creek.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Kittiewan is a Tidewater Virginia plantation located above Kittewan Creek at its confluence with the James River. The property was owned during the Colonial period by the Minge family who built the present house in the mid-18th century. Although the name Kittiewan, or "Konwan", was used for the general vicinity early in the 17th century, the present house dates from the mid-18th century. Its finely crafted paneling would be noteworthy even in a much larger house, and the mantels added to the original woodwork in the late 18th century have a provincial vigor which adds to the interest of the decoration.

Minges apparently came to the Weyanoke peninsula in the third quarter of the 17th century, occupying what is known as Upper Weyanoke plantation. James Minge II first appears in the Charles City County records in 1672. He held various local offices including Clerk of the Court and County Surveyor.

A descendant, James Minge, lived on Weyanoke Peninsula and died there in 1746. His heir, David Minge, held the land which included the present Kittiewan until his own death in 1779. Architectural evidence suggests that the present house was built during David Minge's tenure; it is at the time of his death, as well, that the name Kittiewan first appeared in the record books in connection with the specific tract under consideration. Minge's successors inherited several important Charles City properties from him, including Weyanoke and The Rowe, as well as Kittiewan.

By 1820 Thomas E. Poythress, possibly a Minge relation by marriage, held life ownership of the plantation. In 1834 it was acquired by Robert C. Harrison, who was probably a relative of the Collier Harrison who had married David Minge's widow and heir.

Thus, Kittiewan remained in the Minge-Harrison family for over 175 years, until 1846, when Dr. William A. Selden bought the 971-acre tract. An increase of \$600 worth of buildings in the 1858 tax valuation of Kittiewan may indicate the date of Selden's improvements to the house.

There was considerable military activity near Kittiewan during the Civil War, as Union General Philip A. Sheridan occupied the area between Charles City Court House and the James River. As a result, Selden, a surgeon in the Confederate army, may have abandoned Kittiewan during that time, for he died in Powhatan County in 1865.

Kittiewan has been in the present owners' family since the early 20th century. It is probable that the archaeological remains of the outbuildings survive, and additional information on colonial Virginia plantation life may result from archaeological examinations of the property.

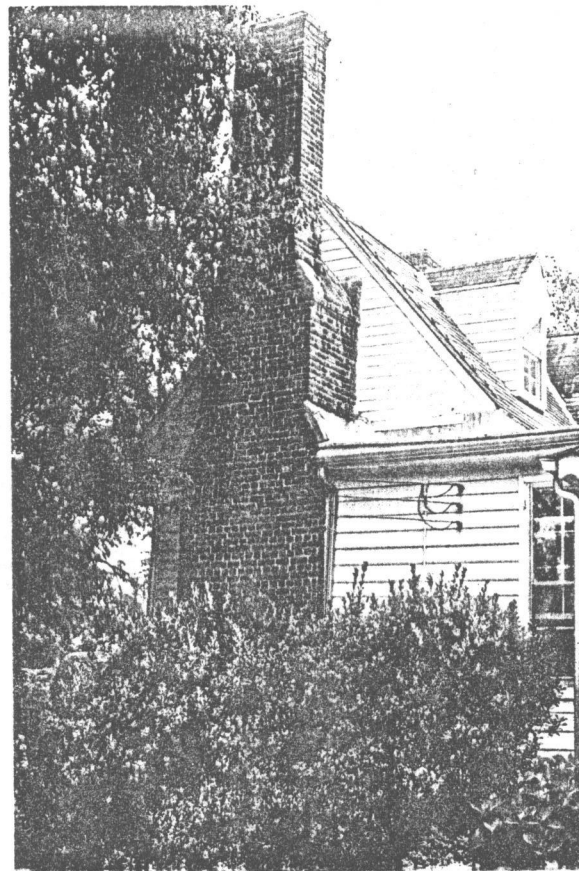
Interior View of East Wall, East Parlor

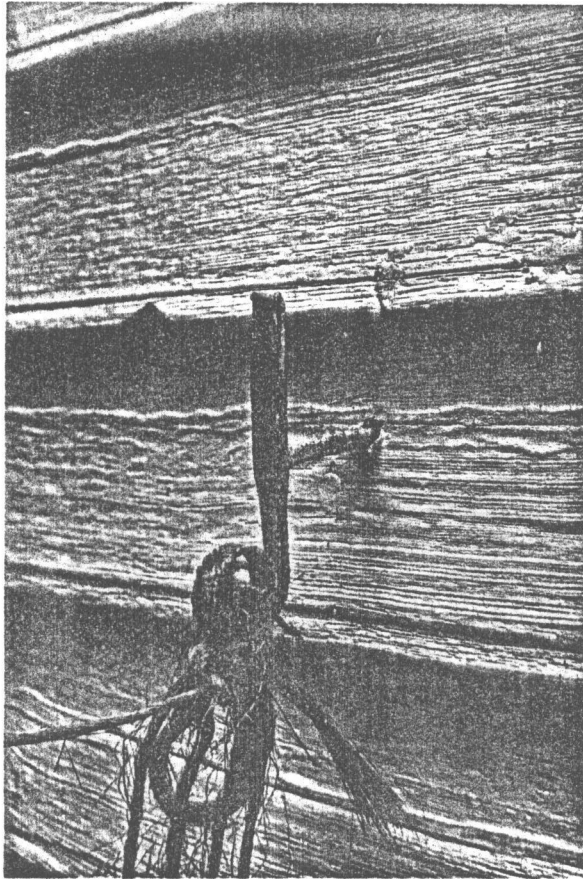

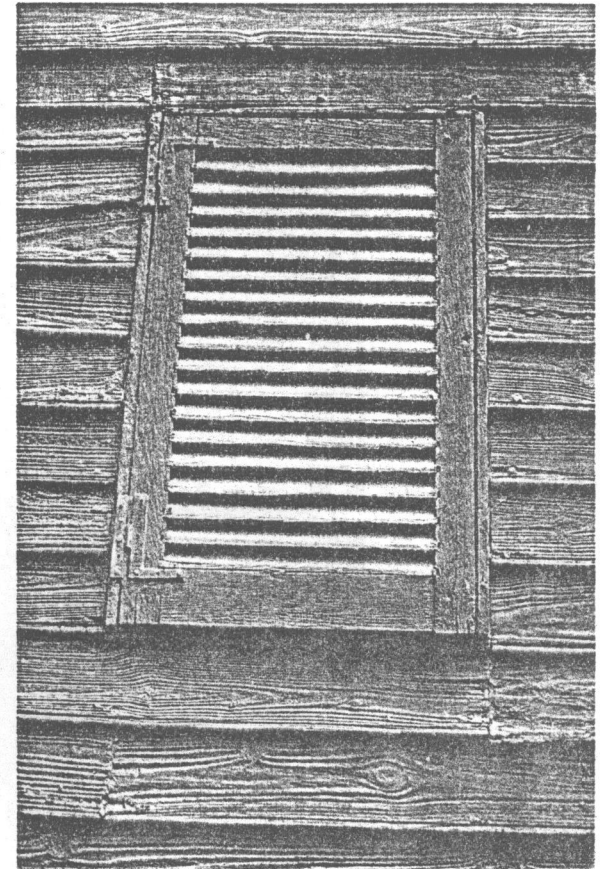
Detail of Original Ell from North

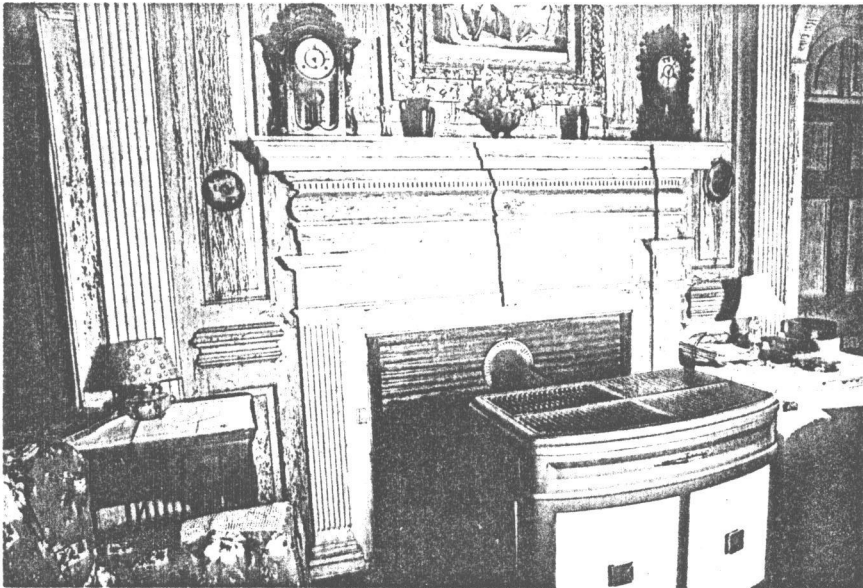
Detail of South Front Shutter Dog



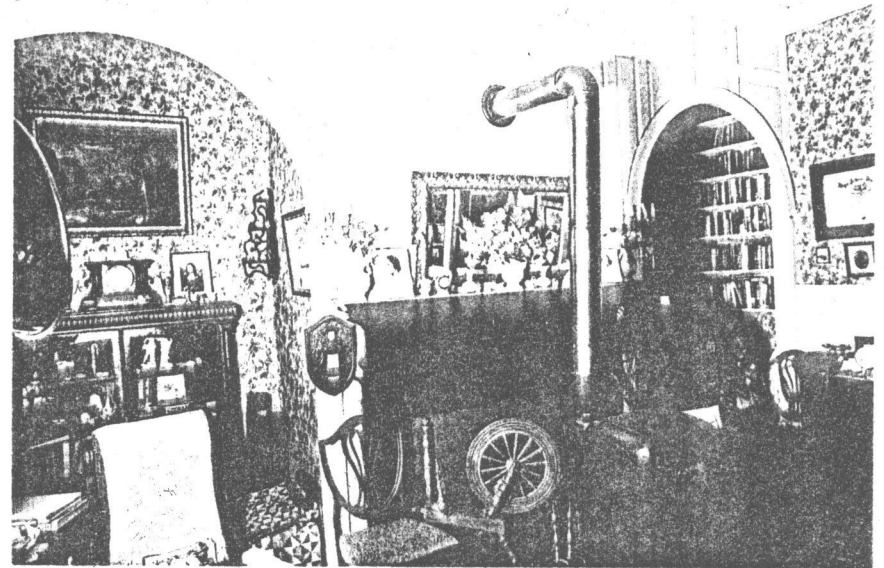
Interior View of Front Passage

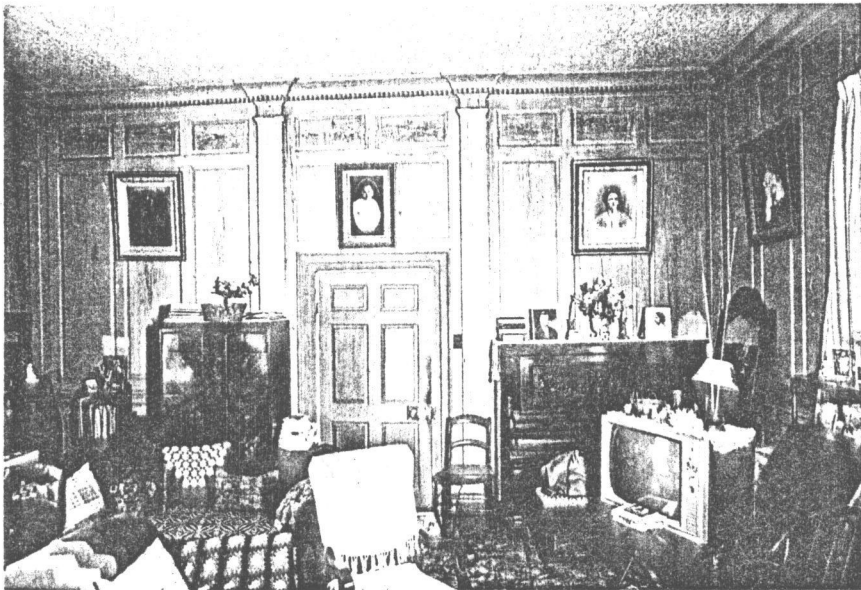




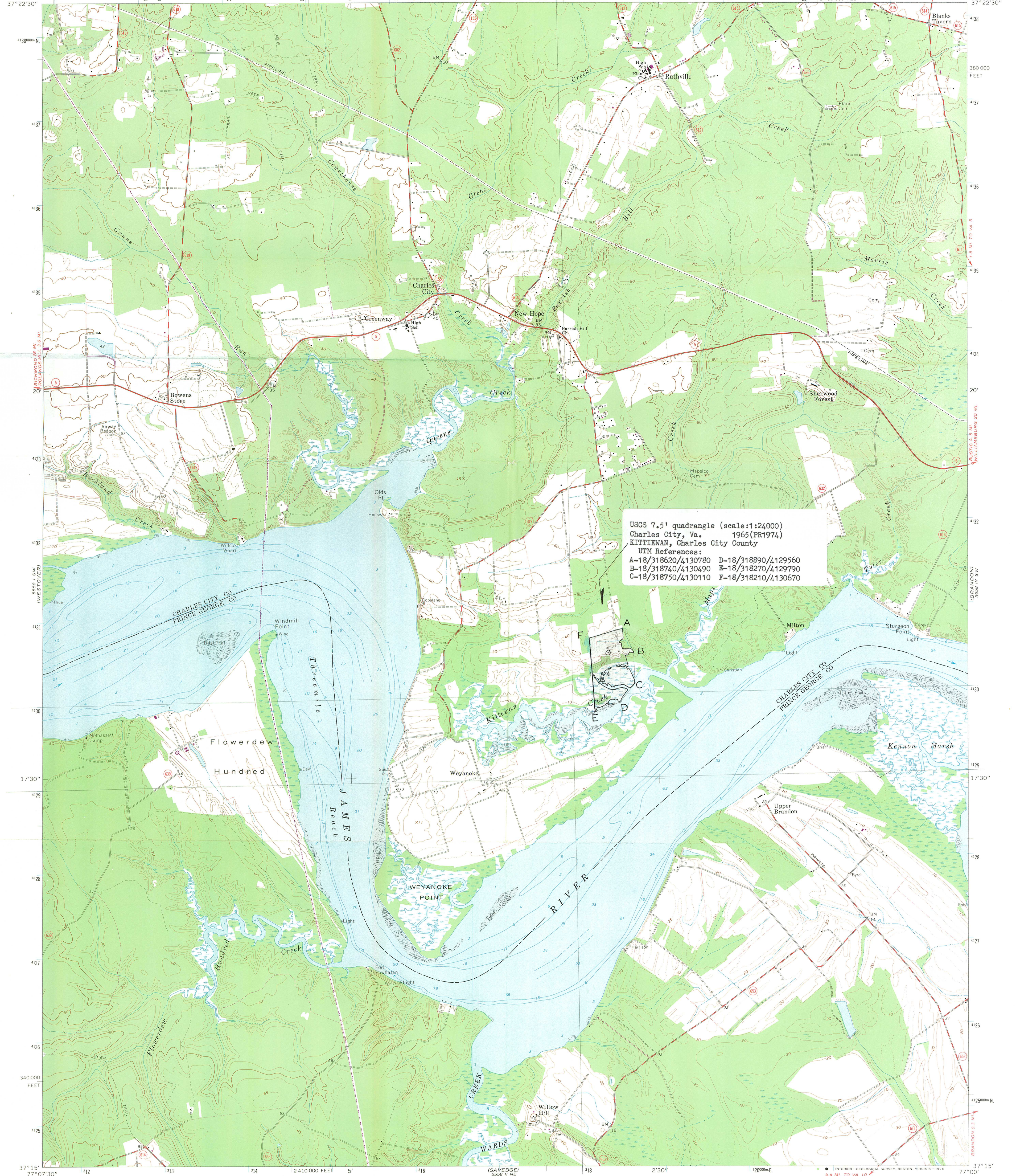
Interior View of East Parlor, East Wall

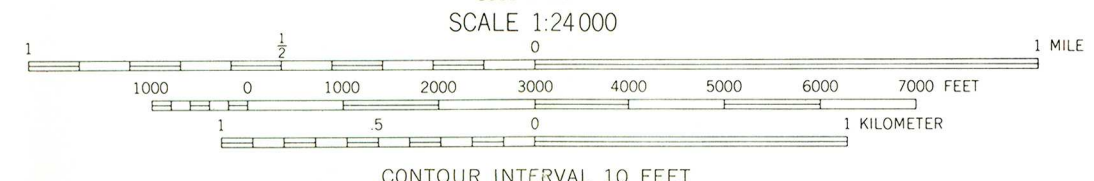
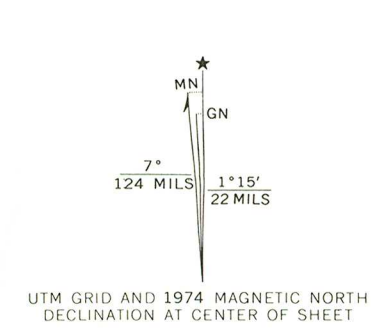

Reference is hereby made to your recent communication dated Oct. 29, 1979, relating to the fact that "Kittiewan" has been nominated for listing in the National Register of Historic Places.

If you will permit me to do so I would like to make a few comments as to why my wife and I feel that this property should be listed. Under the "Criteria for Evaluation" which you state is used in considering property for inclusion in the National Register I would like to respectfully present to you facts that I feel should justify listing "Kittiewan" in the National Register of Historic Places.

A. "Kittiewan" also known early as Kenwan or Konwon and later as Milford was given to Governor George Yeardley by the Virginia Company Nov. 18, 1618. (Ref. Vol. III of the Virginia Co. Records). Governor Yeardley presided over the first General Legislative Assembly in the New World at Jamestown in 1619.

During the Civil War "Kittiewan" was used as a camp site by the Union Forces in 1864 probably under General Sheridan and trenches and gun pits were dug across the plantation, the remains of which are still much in evidence.

B. "Kittiewan" was the home of Dr. William Rickman who on the 18th day of May 1776 was appointed by the Continental Congress, Director General and Chief Physician Surgeon of a Continental Hospital which was established in the Commonwealth of Virginia. (The original appointment document may be seen in the Virginia State Library in Richmond, Va. signed by John Hancock, the second President of the Continental Congress.) He served between May 18, 1776 and Oct. 21, 1780, when his resignation was accepted. Dr. Rickman's widow was granted 6,666 and 2/3 acres of land, by Congress, which was located in Ohio and Indiana for his services in the war. (Ref. Page 364 under heading of Virginia Soldiers of 1776) Dr. Rickman's second wife was Elizabeth Harrison, the daughter of Benjamin Harrison, a signer of the Declaration of Independence from "Berkeley" in Charles City County, Va. Dr. and Mrs. Rickman are buried on this place with a brick wall enclosing the cemetery as specified by Mrs. Elizabeth Harrison Rickman Edmondson in her will.

Re: Kittiewan-663 Cont.

The Medical Society of Virginia has erected a highway marker on Highway 5 in Charles City County, Va., recognizing Dr. William Rickman and in appreciation of his service.

- C. "Kittiewan" house is an original colonial plantation dwelling built of heart pine timber with eleven dormer windows with the original brick foundation being of english bond. It is considered by architects to have been built in the early 1700's and the paneling is of fine workmanship. During the early restoration of Williamsburg, architects from the Rockefeller Foundation made drawings of the paneling and mantels for use in the restoration work and is considered by authorities to be comparable to some of the best in quality in the Country. Mr. Dell Upton, fieldman for the Virginia Historic Landmarks Commission, can verify my statement regarding the paneling as well as the quality of the other woodwork in the house.

For further consideration I have enclosed some pictures of the house as well as the woodwork. I trust that the information that I have furnished you will be sufficient to warrant placing "Kittiewan" in the National Register.

If you should need additional information please advise me. My wife and I wish to extend to you and your staff our thanks and appreciation for your time and interest in this nomination.
