Bush brothers grab media spotlight

NEW ORLEANS -- Texas Gov. George W. Bush basked in renewed national media attention Wednesday and picked up a qualified endorsement for a presidential campaign from his younger brother, the governor-elect of Florida.

Gov.-elect Jeb Bush, joining his Texas brother for the first time since both scored election victories on Nov. 3, said he was encouraging George W. Bush to run for the White House if he could resolve family considerations.

The Bush brothers grabbed the spotlight on the opening day of the Republican Governors Association's annual meeting, bantering with each other and with reporters in a news conference that ended only when security officers helped the Texas governor elbow his way out of a crowded room.

Jeb Bush's comments were the strongest that any member of the Bush family has yet made in support of a potential presidential bid by George W. Bush, who has said he has not yet decided whether to seek the presidency.

"This is an uncivil age that we live in. It's pretty intense politics these days," said Jeb Bush, who will become Florida's chief executive in January.

"He (the Texas governor) has got two teen-age girls who I think are really cool, and having their father run for president is difficult."

But Jeb Bush added: "If he gets through that, and he decides to do it,

I've encouraged him to. I think he would be an awesome candidate. I'm going to vote for him. If he announces his candidacy, we won't have a family vote. Everybody will be lined up to help him."

Twenty-nine Republican governors and governors-elect, some of whom also are considered potential presidential contenders, were expected to attend their annual conference, which runs through Friday. But if any governors whose last name wasn't Bush were seeking media attention, they were in the wrong place Wednesday.

The Bushes' news conference was the major event. Several dozen reporters, photographers and TV camera operators representing most of the country's major news organizations were there.

"I wanted to introduce my little brother to the Texas press corps. It looks like some others came along," George W. Bush deadpanned.

At previous governor conferences, Bush usually has held informal briefings with the handful of Texas reporters attending and private interviews with selected national reporters. But, now that he is widely considered the front-runner for the Republican presidential nomination in 2000, the demand was too great this time, spokeswoman Karen Hughes said.

Hughes said Bush's office had been bombarded with "dozens" of requests for media interviews.

With each Bush brother sitting -- apparently accidentally -- in front of the other's state flag, the first question and many that followed were, not surprisingly, about the presidential race. And George W. Bush's responses were equally not surprising.

"I haven't made up my mind yet," he said. "Right now I'm working on my (second gubernatorial) inauguration speech, and I've got an agenda that I've got to get through the legislative session."

The Texas Legislature will convene on Jan. 12. Bush will be inaugurated for his second term on Jan. 19.

"Let me just say this. (For) someone who is running for president, it would be wise for them to knock on Jeb Bush's door. Florida's an important state," the Texas governor added.

George W. Bush said his main consideration in deciding on a presidential bid was whether he wanted to take his family through the grind of Washington politics.

Although his father, George Bush, was elected president after years of national public service, the Texas governor added:

"I didn't grow up every day wanting to be president of the United States. I grew up wanting to be (baseball star) Willie Mays."

George W. Bush, 52, said it was a "big deal" to see his younger brother, 45, elected governor of Florida.

"I can't tell you how proud I was to see him walk into a Republican governors' meeting," he said. "This guy's a good guy, and I love him a lot."

Jeb Bush's election, the Texas governor added, will make Florida a better state.

But the Texas governor also couldn't resist a little fraternal teasing.

"I've been telling him what to do for 45 years, and he hasn't listened yet," he quipped.

George W. Bush, who called his father a great president, said he developed a "rather thin-skinned reputation" for defending "my dad's honor" during the elder Bush's unsuccessful re-election race in 1992.

"I didn't like to see him get attacked. I found out it's a lot different, though, going from loyal son to candidate and, now, governor."

George W. Bush attended two private meetings with other Republican governors Wednesday and a private luncheon with corporate sponsors of the conference.

Today, he was to discuss his initiative to improve reading skills among Texas' public school students.

Farmland bought for Glades

Reservoirs, marshes to replace sugar fields

The Everglades got two major boosts Friday -- the state and federal government acquired more than 61,000 acres of farmland critical to the restoration of the vast wetland, and

Gov. Jeb Bush appointed a conservationist to oversee the state's role in the project.

J. Allison DeFoor II -- a seventh-generation Floridian and former sheriff of Monroe County -- will fill a new post as "Everglades policy coordinator," overseeing the state's role in the planned \$7.8 billion restoration project.

Critical to that restoration are large blocks of Palm Beach County farmland known as the Talisman Sugar Holdings, which the government acquired from Talisman's owner, St. Joe Corp., after more than 10 years of trying. In a complicated transaction involving a \$133.5 million purchase and numerous land swaps, the federal government acquired 45,114 acres for reservoirs and the state got another 10,708 acres for pollution-cleansing marshes. In a related deal, the state also agreed to buy an additional 5,280-acre farm for storing water.

The Talisman deal is the largest single acquisition of farmland for conservation purposes in South Florida.

"No one has ever taken 55,000 acres back from human use and made it useful again for the Everglades ecosystem," said Charles Lee, Florida Audubon's senior vice president.

Even the sugar companies, which two months ago sued to block the Talisman acquisition, saluted the deal -- even though they face a net loss of farmland in the sprawling Everglades Agricultural Area near Lake Okeechobee. The sugar companies will give up seven acres for every six they get in the swaps, and have agreed to drop the lawsuit.

"The sacrifice of acreage is very difficult," said Alfonso Fanjul, chairman of Florida Crystals Corp. "But in this instance, the environment had to take precedence."

Marshes will cleanse water

Acquisition of the Talisman land has been a top priority for government restoration

planners and conservationists for more than a decade. The farms are considered critical to establishing a series of reservoirs and marshes for storing and cleansing water that flows into the Everglades from agricultural land south of the lake.

The final land deal closely resembles a compromise plan drawn up by Gov.

Lawton Chiles. On the day before he died of heart failure, Chiles presented the plan to officials at the U.S. Department of the Interior in Washington, D.C.

"Having this deal be the last thing he did resonated well with people and helped get the deal done," said Bill Leary, an environmental advisor to Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt.

Now it is up to DeFoor to carry on Chiles' work as a restoration dealmaker. The new Everglades policy coordinator will have a daunting task of keeping state officials, conservationists and businesses on track for the restoration that is expected to take decades to complete.

An amateur historian, DeFoor is accustomed to taking a long view of Florida's unique environment. His earliest ancestor here arrived at Key West in 1829. He wrote a book about him last year, *Odet Philippe: Peninsular Pioneer*.

Nod to early environmentalists

DeFoor, 45, a member of Florida Audubon's board of directors, is aware of the historic importance of his new role. He is quick to name giants who preceded him in protection of the Everglades, a long-running crusade that has outlasted all of them: the late Marjory Stoneman Douglas, John Pennekamp and George Barley.

"I want to continue that tradition," DeFoor said.

In announcing his appointment of DeFoor, Bush also showed he recognized the historic nature of the restoration.

"If done right," Bush said, "this will be a legacy . . . that will make all of us proud."

DeFoor, a Republican, was Gov. Bob Martinez's running mate in 1990 in his failed bid for reelection. He was a Monroe County sheriff (1989-90) and a county judge and circuit judge in the Keys (1983-87).

A lawyer in Key Largo since, his business interests have ranged from electronic monitoring of prisoners with Wackenhut Monitoring to an international pharmaceutical business. Bush considered him as a candidate for secretary of corrections as well as environmental protection.

DeFoor, who normally practices law in a pair of shorts, is the quintessential midlife wanderer. Since 1994, he has pursued a master's degree in divinity at the South Florida Center for Theological Studies.

"I have traveled in some pretty antagonistic circles," DeFoor said.

Agency chief from north

In addition to DeFoor, Bush also announced the appointment of David Struhs, 38, as secretary of the Department of Environmental Protection. Struhs succeeds Ginger Wetherell, a former legislator who has moved on to lobbying.

Since 1995, Struhs has served as commissioner of environmental protection in Massachusetts, where he takes credit for erasing 10,000 environmental permits from the books. He served as chief of staff for the Council on Environmental Quality under former President Bush.

Struhs said environmental regulators must focus "more on results, more on protection and less on process," placing inspectors "in the field" with potential polluters, rather than confined to desks as permit-pushers.

With nearly 800 people moving to Florida each day, he said, "Our job is to make sure we preserve the beauty and the natural resources and the economic opportunity that attracted them in the first place."

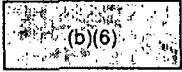

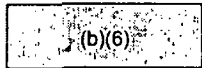

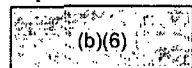

Bush seeking options for elderly care

Only a few hours of help three times a week make all the difference in the world for Lucille Johnson. Without the boost from community care, the 91-year-old might have to move to a nursing home. With it, she can stay where she's comfortable -- at home.

But the care that Johnson enjoys can be hard to come by. An estimated 12,000 seniors statewide sit on the waiting list for community care. One-third of these seniors live in South Florida; both Broward and Dade have waiting lists of about 2,000 each.

Gov. Jeb Bush wants to eradicate those lengthy waiting lists and save money by focusing on less expensive home-based care rather than nursing homes. His proposed budget includes a 12.4 percent or \$26.6 million increase for elderly services, the largest boost in recent memory and one that could provide care to all who request it.

"The longer we can keep them in their own home, the better for them and the better for the state of Florida financially," said John Stokesberry, executive director of Dade's Alliance for Aging. "A lot of people go into nursing homes by default because there's no community care available."

A year of community care, a patchwork of services for elders

offered by a variety
of community agencies, can cost the state in the low
thousands for each senior.
Nursing-home care for just one month can run \$3,000 or
higher.

Community care is not just a cost-saver, it's a crowd-pleaser
among the elder set
who want, as the catch-phrase says, to age in place.

"I'm going to stay home as long as I can," said Johnson,
who lives in Broward. "I'm
not going to leave my home until I absolutely have to."

Anyone 60 or older who has multiple impairments is eligible
for the services.
Recipients must chip in a co-payment, which ranges from a \$1
on up, depending on
the person's income. Each county has a clearinghouse agency
that handles requests
for services.

The help doesn't have to be elaborate. Simple homemaking
assistance, such as in
Johnson's case, personal care, home-delivered meals, or
day-care programs to
provide caregivers with a respite from their duties can all
keep seniors at home.

"We're really working with people who if we stop services,
in six months to a year
they're probably going to end up in a nursing home," said
Marlene Wilson, director of
Broward County's Elderly Services Division.

In Broward about 2,200 people receive community care
services. The state sends
about \$4 million for services to Broward and the county chips
in another \$1.2 million.

In Dade about 5,000 people have community care services, and
the program
receives about \$5.5 million in state funds.

Advocates for seniors scoff at a system that invites retirees
down to Florida, gladly
takes their leisure dollars, then throws up its hands when
they become infirm.

"We encourage people to come to sunny Florida to live, spend
their money in our
shopping centers and then when they reach an age where they
need assistance, we
say, 'Why did you come to Florida?'" said Edith Lederberg,

executive director of
Broward's Area Agency on Aging.

Many of those who languish on the waiting list wind up in nursing homes. Others die.

Others move away. And some, of course, do eventually get the care they requested.

Even for those who do not mind living in them, nursing homes may not hold all the

answers -- nor all of Florida's elderly. There are 70,000 nursing home beds in the state and 3.2 million people 65 and older, pointed out Ed Towey, spokesman for the Florida Health Care Association.

And the gap will only grow as the baby boom generation ages.

"With the increasing number of elderly, it's not a concern of nursing homes that they will have a shortage of customers," Towey said, adding of Bush's proposal, "We think it's literally one of the best things that's happened for Florida's elderly in a long time."

The proposal's success hinges on legislative approval. If that doesn't come, those waiting lists may stretch longer and, Lederberg said, "instead of aging in place, people will be dying in place."

Continued progress for Alaska families is jeopardized by the dramatic drop in the world price of oil (the lowest since North Slope oil production began), which largely fuels Alaskan economy and funds vital public services. This has created an increase in the Alaskan budget gap to \$1 billion.

In order to raise \$26 million a year required to match the new federal funds, Governor Knowles asks the users of Alaska,s highways to contribute about a 9-cent a gallon increase in Alaska,s fuel tax. Even with a 9-cent increase, 45 states still will have higher gas taxes than Alaska.

Governor Knowles commended the Legislature for implementing in part the &Smart Start8 program last year dedicated to better protecting Alaska,s children. It includes new troopers and child protection workers, better health care, foster care, adoption, child care, as well as strengthening families at risk. Federal Medicaid formula changed in order to provide \$32 million funding.

The Governor intends to invest more than \$600 million a year over the next five years to improve transportation. A 10-year \$350 million overhaul of Anchorage International Airport (including transportation links) was launched. \$300 million has been invested into 261 rural airports. This past year the record 1.4 million visitors helped make tourism Alaska,s second largest private sector employer, bringing in over \$1 billion.

Might bring up concern that Congressional delegation is taking away power from the states; federal regulators recently rejected the welfare privatization program as well as continue to discourage Proposition 203's coverage for the working poor.

This year's major health initiative is called &Arizona's PATH8 (Positive Action for Tomorrow's Health). What is unique about this plan is that it utilizes funds from the tobacco settlement. Its first priority is to address the needs of the mental state hospital, which is in poor condition.

Governor Hull recommends a mixture of pay-as-you-go financing and state revenue bonds to finance public school facilities. Under this plan, over 60% of Students First funding (more than \$468 million over the next two years) would be financed on a pay-as-you-go basis. Adding &trigger language to the budget could eliminate need for state revenue bonds. If FY 1999 or FY 2000 surplus is greater than anticipated, bonds issued the following year would be reduced on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

The Governor is pleased with having received \$685 million in federal transportation funds under the new federal highway bill. Freeway system should be complete by 2007.

FEMA/Citrus - freeze resulted in gubernatorial disaster declarations for seven counties with Governor Davis following former Governor Pete Wilson's request (December 31, 1998) for \$10 million dollars from the Dept. of Labor as an initial figure. Governor Davis, request is dated February 8, 1999 and on Feb 9, POTUS authorized Disaster Unemployment Assistance under the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, P.L. 93-288, as amended (&the Stafford Act) in the amount deemed appropriate by FEMA. As per Vice President Al Gore's request, a copy of the Disaster Declaration issued by President George Bush in 1991 resulting in \$800 Million in damages due to similar freezing conditions has been received and is on file.

The Vice President and Mrs. Gore hosted then Governor-Elect Davis at NAVOBS on November 14, 1998. This was followed by a meeting with POTUS in the Oval Office on the 15th.

California still ranks at/near the bottom of all states according to the National Assessment for Education Progress. Under READ (Raising Expectations, Achievement and Development), Governor Davis proposes \$444 million to improve the reading skills of children, to enhance the quality of teachers, and to toughen standards of performance and accountability.

The Governor proposes to spend more than \$50 million retraining teachers and improving principals, performance, as well as seeks \$100 million to establish a peer-review process for teachers wherein principals would be required to consider the results of peer reviews in their staffing decisions. If a teacher receives an unfavorable review, he/she will be given an opportunity to improve; if there is no improvement after an appropriate period of time, the review will be conveyed to the local school board.

Governor Davis is targeting \$42 million for school accountability to promote reforms in underachieving schools; evaluations and grants will be provided to 200 schools per year selected from the bottom 50% of standardized tests. He also strongly promotes a rigorous high school graduation exam beginning in 2003 requiring the mastery of math and communication skills.

The Governor suggests extending the \$100 million Citizens, Option for Public Safety program (which would otherwise terminate June 2000) and hiring up to 700 new police officers.

Secretary Contreras-Sweet and Health and Human Services Secretary Grantland Johnson are consulting with medical, business, and patient

representatives to come up with more effective options regarding the regulation of the health care industry.

Youth Crime Gun Interdiction Initiative (YCGII): Treasury and its Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) will release the second year report on its comprehensive crime gun tracing program. YCGII is a collaborative program between Federal, state and local law enforcement in 27 cities across the country to prevent illegal access to firearms by juveniles by tracing and analyzing guns used in crimes to build criminal cases against gun traffickers, and to develop broad strategies to prevent access to guns by juveniles and criminals. On February 17, Treasury and ATF sent a YCGII Performance Report to Congress, summarizes the investigative findings of the annual report, and identifies over 640 illegal trafficking investigations involving juveniles and youth and nearly 27,000 firearms. The two reports confirm that there is illegal trafficking in new, used, and stolen firearms, and that crime gun trace information is assisting ATF and other law enforcement agencies in identifying, investigating, and arresting illegal gun traffickers.

As an example - here's what I've got so far....

ALABAMA

Governor Don Siegelman (D) defeated Fob James last November 58% to 42% to win his first term as governor.

The biggest question in Alabama right now is whether Siegelman will get the education lottery on which he campaigned. The lottery will require a constitutional amendment, and Siegelman will have a tough time getting a lottery special election bill passed by the legislature when they convene next month. Religious and conservative groups are still very much against the plan.

On his first day in office, Siegelman signed an executive order instructing school administrators to begin the process of removing portable classrooms.

CONNECTICUT

Governor Rowland (R) defeated former Rep. Barbara Kennelly 63% to 35% to win his second term. A University of Connecticut poll conducted January 25-31 showed Governor Rowland with a 69% job approval rating.

INDIANA

In 1996, Governor Frank O,Bannon (D) came from behind to defeat Indianapolis Mayor Steve Goldsmith (R) 52%-47% to win his first term.

He served as Lt. Governor for eight years under then Governor Evan Bayh.

He consistently posts approval ratings in the 70s, and is in strong shape

for his reelection campaign next year.

IOWA

In a dramatic come-from-behind race, state Senator Vilsack (D) defeated former Rep. Jim Ross Lightfoot (R) 53% to 46% to become Iowa's first Democratic governor in 30 years. He follows Governor Terry Branstad (R), who had served as governor of the state since 1983.

A Des Moines Register poll conducted January 22-25 showed that Governor Tom Vilsack's (D) job approval rating is 57%, his disapproval rating is only 5%, while 38% were unsure.

The two hottest issues in the state Legislature are education initiatives and methamphetamine use. The Governor and the Legislature have agreed on a three-part school finance package that includes a 4% increase in per-pupil spending for the 2001 budget year, a guarantee that school districts with enrollment losses would be allowed to spend the same amount next year on regular programs as this year, and accelerated state aid totaling \$4 million for districts with growing enrollments. Governor Vilsack is now trying to get a five-year plan approved which would further increase education spending, limit K-3 class sizes to 17 students, and demand accountability from local school districts. The legislature likely will pass a weakened version of the plan.

Governor Vilsack has put forth a plan which addresses education, treatment and law enforcement. The most controversial part of his plan calls for mandatory life sentences for those caught selling meth to children. Republicans are debating the issue. This stance has made Vilsack appear to be the hawk and Republicans the doves when it comes to getting tough with drug pushers.

Vilsack and his Lt. Governor, Sally Pederson, have a very strong partnership, much like your relationship with the Vice President. Vilsack and Pederson are developing a reinventing government initiative, modeled after the Vice President's.

LOUISIANA

Since his election in 1995, Governor Mike Foster (R) has consistently posted approval ratings over 70%. A Southern Media & Opinion poll conducted January 21-25 showed Foster with a 79% job approval rating. He has raised nearly \$2 million for his reelection campaign this year, though he says that he has not yet decided whether he will run. To date, Rep. William Jefferson (D) is the only Democrat who has announced his candidacy for the race.

NORTH CAROLINA

Governor Jim Hunt (D) is term-limited. In 1996, he defeated Robin Hayes (R) 56% to 43%.

SOUTH CAROLINA

Governor Jim Hodges (D) defeated former governor David Beasley 53% to 46% in a hard fought race.

TENNESSEE

Governor Don Sundquist (R) easily won reelection last November against his challenger, Nashville attorney John Jay Hooker (D), 69%-30%.

VERMONT

Governor Howard Dean (D), who first assumed office in '91, won his bid for reelection last November by defeating Ruth Dwyer (R) 56% to 41%. Gubernatorial elections in Vermont are held every two years. Dean served as DGA chair in 1997-98.

VIRGINIA

Governor Jim Gilmore (R) defeated Lt. Governor Don Beyer (D) 56% to 43% in 1997, replacing term-limited George Allen (R). Gilmore has suggested that Virginia allow its governors to serve for two terms, instead of the current one term limit. A similar measure to amend the state constitution on this issue passed the state Senate in '95, but the House of Delegates defeated it.

MAINE

Last fall, Governor Angus King (I) defeated Republican former state Representative James Longley, Democrat Thomas Connolly, and fellow Independent Patricia LaMarche, 59% to 20%, 12%, and 7% respectively. In his second term, King intends to complete what he called &unfinished business,⁸ including a major push to improve education and raise the aspirations of Maine students.

Education is a top issue in Maine. A study released this week by a 16-member commission appointed by the state Legislature found that incidents of school violence are on the rise in Maine high schools. While Maine schools are generally as safe, or safer, than schools elsewhere in the country, the commission raised concerns that violence among younger children is becoming more frequent.

KANSAS

Gov. Bill Graves (R) re-elected to a second term in 1998, Graves is not eligible to run again. Graves 73.36 % margest margin in state Tom Sawyer 22.65 %. The biggest issue in Kansas state politics today is the comprehensive transportation program. The governor,s proposal would place Kansas in debt for decades and is considered dead on arrival. Also, the state legislature is making further attempts to restrict abortion.

MONTANA

In the 1996 general election, Marc Racicot (R) won a second term with 79%

- 19% against Judy Jacobson (D). In 1992, Governor Racicot (R) beat Dorothy Bradley (D) 51% - 49%.

NEBRASKA

Lincoln Mayor Mike Johanns (R) defeated Bill Hoppner (D) 54 % - 45%. Governor Johanns replaced Ben Nelson (D), governor for the past eight years who was term limited. Johanns was elected to the Lancaster County Board of Commissioners in 1982, and then elected to the Lincoln City Council in 1989. He was elected mayor in 1991 and ran unopposed in 1995. Johanns, wife Stephanie, a former state senator. It is unclear whether Hoppner, who barely lost the Democratic gubernatorial primary in 1990, will attempt to run again.

NORTH DAKOTA

Edward T. Schafer (R) 66% beat Lee Kaldor (D) 34% and Schafer beat 58% Nicholas Spaeth (D) 41%.

SOUTH DAKOTA

Gov. Bill Janklow (R) just won re-election in '98 and is not up until 2002.

WYOMING

Gov. Jim Geringer (R) was re-elected in 1998 and his term ends in 2002.

IDAHO

Gov. Dirk Kempthorne (R), just elected in 1998, Kempthorne's term is not up until 2002. Kempthorne won handily. Kempthorne, who served one term in U.S. Senate, succeeds Phil Batt (R) as Idaho's governor after soundly defeating former Idaho Supreme Court Justice Robert Huntley (D) and independent candidate Peter Rickards. In the Democratic primary only 27,000 people voted - - a sign of how far the Idaho Democratic Party has fallen. In Idaho, Democrats were elected governors six consecutive times from 1970-1990.

DELAWARE

Governor Tom Carper (D) is seriously weighing a bid for U.S. Senate. Incumbent Senator William Roth (R) has not announced his intentions for 2000, although most analysts expect him to run for another term. At the request of the DSCC, Vice President Gore will call Governor Carper this week to urge him to run. Former governor and current Rep. Tom Castle (R) will run for the Republican nomination if Roth does not, and he has not ruled out a primary challenge to Roth, although it is unlikely.

FLORIDA

Governor Jeb Bush (R)?

NEW YORK

Governor George Pataki (R), who cruised to victory over Democratic challenger Peter F. Vallone, has been traveling the country speaking out on behalf of moderate Republican causes. Many believe that Pataki is setting himself to be the GOP Vice Presidential nominee. Pataki has also been voluble in his criticism of Vice President Gore.

Governor Pataki continues to feud with New York City Mayor Rudolph Giuliani over various issues, mainly the level of education funding for the City of New York.

NEW JERSEY

Wednesday's surprise announcement by Senator Frank Lautenberg (D) have Governor Christie Todd Whitman (R) seriously weighing a bid for the Senate. Whitman's moderate policies as governor nearly guarantee her a primary challenge from the conservative wing of the party, and a primary could drive a large wedge in the New Jersey GOP.

The meeting will be held from 9:30-11:15 a.m. in the East Room. Press coverage will be inhouse pool for the remarks only.

President Clinton will be joined by Vice President Gore, Governors from 53 states and territories, members of the President,s Cabinet, and senior members of the White House staff. (see attached list of participants). The Governors are in Washington to participate in the NGA,s 1999 Winter Meeting, scheduled for February 20-23, 1999.

President Clinton will open the program with 15 minute remarks, and introduce NGA Chairman Governor Tom Carper (D-DE). Governor Carper will then deliver five minute remarks and introduce NGA Vice Chair Governor Mike Leavitt (R-UT). Governor Leavitt will then make five minute remarks and introduce Vice President Gore. Vice President Gore will then make five minute remarks. The pool will then be pulled from the room. Governor Carper will then begin a roundtable discussion, and conclude the dialogue at approximately 11:15 a.m.

a large rectangular table. The President, Vice President, NGA Chairman, and NGA Vice Chairman will be on the South side of the East Room. The press pool will be on the North side of the East Room.

ALABAMA

Last week, Lt. Governor Steve Windom (R) gaveled through changes in Senate operating procedures to restore the traditional powers of his office over the objection of the Democratic majority of the Senate, which had taken away the powers in January. On Tuesday, Circuit Court Judge Charles Price (D) ruled that Lt. Governor Steve Windom (R) & knowingly and intentionally violated the constitution and the laws of Alabama⁸ when he ordered new Senate rules passed on an unrecorded vote while 18 Democratic senators screamed in protest. Windom immediately appealed Price,s ruling to the Alabama Supreme Court, where Republicans hold a 5-4 majority. The state Supreme Court stayed Judge Price,s decision and began hearing arguments in the case today. The Democratic senators began their boycott of Senate sessions on March 2. They reconvened for a short time on Thursday, March 11, before the session broke down into partisan bickering. The Senate has exhausted 10 of the 30 legislative days it is allowed for session. The state Legislature is taking a break until March 23 while the court decides the Democratic senators, case. A decision is expected next week. The Democratic senators asked three of the Republican justices to step aside from the case because they attended a news conference Windom held on March 2 after passing the new Senate rules.

On Wednesday, a house committee approved a proposed constitutional amendment that would require the governor and lieutenant governor to run as a ticket in an attempt to avoid similar disputes in the future. The legislation would take effect in 2006.

On Tuesday, Governor Don Siegelman,s (D) legislation that would allow a referendum on a state lottery benefitting education cleared the House of Representatives with a 70-31 vote. Siegleman stated, &This was a joint effort of Democrats and Republicans working together. They are giving Alabama an opportunity to vote on the most important piece of legislation in history.⁸ The bill will go to the Senate for a vote when they reconvene.

CALIFORNIA

On Monday, the state Senate unanimously approved a bill to ensure that delegates chosen in California,s blanket primary next March are seated at the Republican and Democratic presidential conventions. As you may recall, last week the state,s 1996 blanket primary law was upheld. This law allows registered voters to vote for any candidate regardless of political affiliation. However, under the rules of the Democratic and

Republican parties, only registered party members can participate in the selection of the parties, delegates to presidential nominating conventions. In order to satisfy both the blanket primary law and the rules of the parties, the bill would require voters to cast two ballots. On the first ballot, Californians would vote for candidates of their choice, without regard to party affiliation. On a separate ballot, Democratic, Republican, and some minor party members would vote for delegates pledged to their party's presidential contenders. These votes would be counted and used to apportion delegates to the national conventions. The bill was approved in the Senate 35 to 0 and will be sent to the Assembly.

On Tuesday, state Senator Adam Schiff (D) was in Washington, DC, meeting with Political Affairs staff and the DCCC regarding his intention to challenge Rep. James Rogan (R). Entertainment attorney and Co-Chair of the Los Angeles Saxophone Club Paul Krekorian (D) also is interested in seeking the Democratic nomination to challenge Rogan.

On Wednesday, Governor Gray Davis (D) announced the appointment of actor/director Rob Reiner as the head of a state commission to guide new programs for young children. Reiner will serve without salary as chairman of the nine-member state Children and Families First Commission, which is charged with overseeing locally operated health and education programs aimed at preschoolers and their parents. The programs are funded by Reiner's successful campaign to raise cigarette taxes by 50 cents a pack, Proposition 10, which passed last November by 57,000 votes out of more than 7.6 million ballots.

On Thursday, a Contra Costa judge ordered computer magnate William Tauscher to pay his wife, Rep. Ellen Tauscher (D) \$30,644 a month for spousal and child support while the couple battles over the terms of their divorce. In November 1997, Rep. Tauscher received an anonymous email that William was having an affair. After months of counseling following William's admission to the affair, Tauscher filed for divorce last December. In her divorce petition, Tauscher accused her husband of concealing and misappropriating their joint assets - in part to pay expenses for his mistress. She also contends that he took out a \$15 million loan without her knowledge and is trying to force her to pay off part of it. She further said William always insisted that we live large. At stake is an estate worth approximately \$18 million, spousal support and custody of the couple's 7-year-old daughter, Katherine.

State Senator Tom Hayden (D) and state Assemblywoman Sheila Kuehl (D), whose districts overlap, have announced their intentions to trade legislative seats next year. Under the state law on term limits, both must give up their seats next year. Each has sent letters to their legislative colleagues stating their intention to run and requesting their support. Immediately after making their announcement, state Assemblyman Wally Knox (D) of Beverly Hills who also must give up his seat next year, announced his intention to run for Hayden's senate seat. Kuehl is expected to receive the Democratic nomination. To date, no Republicans have expressed interest in running for the seat.

This week, a state report on prison population reported that state crime

statistics have plummeted. The report pointed out that in March 1994, California signed the nation's stricter "three strikes" law, and that consequently, state prison populations are soaring and court dockets are jammed. While key politicians and prosecutors continue to applaud their impact in reducing crime, critics say it is now necessary to limit the laws. The debate is expected to heat up in coming months over a bill proposing to restrict third strike convictions to serious or violent felonies.

FLORIDA

On Saturday, Senator Connie Mack (R) will officially announce his retirement. The potential list of candidates to replace him is long on both sides of the aisle. Republicans include Rep. Mark Foley, Rep. Bill McCollum, 1998 Senate nominee Charlie Crist, Education Commissioner Tom Gallagher, and state Senate President Toni Jennings. Possible Democrats include Rep. Peter Deutsch, Insurance Commissioner Bill Nelson, Miami-Dade Mayor Alex Penelas, Rep. Robert Wexler, and EPA Administrator Carol Browner. Rep. Deutsch and Commissioner Nelson have already begun making calls throughout Florida to line up political and financial support for the race.

The possibility of a contested Senate race also has created a domino effect for down-ballot races. State Rep. Jon Cosgrove (D) already has announced that he will run for Insurance Commissioner if Bill Nelson runs for Senate, and several potential candidates have expressed interest in the seats of Reps. Foley, Deutsch and McCollum. While Rep. McCollum's seat is solidly Republican and Rep. Deutsch's seat is solidly Democratic, Rep. Foley's seat is marginal, and a strong Democratic candidate could win in that district.

IOWA

On Friday, Iowa Democratic Party Chair Roxanne Conlin announced that she will resign her position effective March 13. She stated that her legal practice had required an inordinate amount of her time. Conlin is considered to be one of the top female attorneys in the country. The Party will have a regularly scheduled Central Committee meeting on Saturday and will decide how to fill the post during the meeting.

Last week, a fundraising letter penned by James Carville to benefit

Senator Tom Harkin (D) was mailed. The letter states, &As long as I live, I,ll never forget how one strong leader, Senator Tom Harkin, has stepped forward and defended the President with courage and tenacity. Even when other Democrats were afraid to step forward, Tom Harkin rose to defend the President,s right to fair treatment, and to remind all Americans that this President has worked his tail off to earn their support.8

KENTUCKY

On Wednesday Governor Paul Patton (D) appointed State Democratic Chair Ronald McCloud to serve as Public Protection Secretary. Party chair over the last 18 months, McCloud has been credited with keeping Democratic majorities in both state Houses as well as ensuring Governor Patton,s uncontested primary. Vice Chair Moretta Bosley will act as the temporary chair until the state central committee elects a new chair. The Public Protection Secretary oversees several major regulatory agencies, such as the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control.

LOUISIANA

Former Ku Klux Klan leader and former state representative David Duke (R) is publicly re-embracing his old, extremist views by speaking before white supremacist groups and publishing a book that lays out a plan for an Aryan revolution. In his book My Awakening, Duke presents a plan for a revolution to preserve the Aryan way of life in a country he says is filled with genetically less intelligent, crime-prone black people and supremacist Jews who control both Hollywood and the media. Duke is running in the May 1 special election to replace retired Rep. Bob Livingston (R).

On Monday, the American Jewish Conference (AJC) released a statement announcing that the organization is satisfied that the Republican National Committee has done everything it could to disavow Duke. The AJC recently called on the RNC to expel Duke from the party. RNC Chair Jim Nicholson told the AJC that party officials had taken firm steps to make certain Duke receives no assistance from the Republican Party, financial or otherwise.

MICHIGAN

In a rumored orchestrated chain of announcements, both state Senator Diane Byrum (D) and former Governor James Blanchard (D) suddenly withdrew their names from the 2000 Senate race to challenge Senator Spence Abraham. Their departure clears the field for Rep. Debbie Stabenow (D), who is expected to announce her candidacy this spring. Insiders say Stabenow was encouraged by a recent internal poll that showed she has broad appeal with Republicans, women, and independents. Byrum has endorsed Stabenow and is reportedly interested in running for her House seat. Other potential Democrats include +94 Senate nominee Joel Ferguson, +98 gubernatorial nominee Geoffrey Fieger, and Rep. Bart Stupak (D). Fieger has hinted that he would consider running as an independent candidate if the state party does not support his candidacy.

On Tuesday, I met with Flint Mayor Woodrow Stanley (D), who is seeking support for his upcoming mayoral election this year. He noted that economic factors in Flint, particularly the pending loss of the GM

&Buick City8 Plant, may lead to a competitive mayoral race this fall. As you know, Mayor Stanley has been a vocal supporter of the administration.

MINNESOTA

On Wednesday, Governor Jesse Ventura (Reform) endorsed the Reform Party candidate, former Fairmont City Council member and former Republican Terry Anderson, for this month,s special election for the state Senate being vacated Tracy Beckman (DFL). Beckman, who ran unsuccessfully for Rep. Gil Gutknecht,s (R) seat last year, was appointed to serve as Minnesota,s Executive Director of the U.S. Farm Service Agency last Friday. The March 30 special election will be the first test of Ventura,s ability to translate his personal popularity into public support of a Reform Party candidate. Last week, Ventura said he hoped to elect a dozen Reform Party candidates to the state House and Senate in 2000. State Democrats are hoping to hold this Democratic leaning district. Democrats have a commanding 42-24 majority in the state Senate.

MISSOURI

Last Saturday, State House Speaker Steve Gaw (D) announced his candidacy to run for secretary of state after last week,s surprise announcement by incumbent Bekki Cook (D) that she will not run next year. Cook, who had been mentioned as a possible candidate for governor or lieutenant governor, plans to practice law in the private sector at the end of her term. Her decision means that four of the five statewide offices appearing on the 2000 ballot will be open. Missouri,s voters also will select a new governor, lieutenant governor and treasurer. Attorney General Jay Nixon (D) is seeking a third term.

The Kansas City mayoral general election on March 30 between former city council member Kay Waldo Barnes (D) and city council member George Blackwood (D) is expected to be tight due to a predicted record-low voter turnout. In the nonpartisan primary on March 2, in which only 53,000 votes were cast, Barnes won 29% of the vote, while Blackwood was a close second at 25%. Mayor Emanuel Cleaver (D) is term-limited; he has refused to endorse either candidate.

MONTANA

Senator Conrad Burns (R) mailed a letter of apology to the Montana Equipment Dealers Association (MEDA) for his use of a pejorative description of Arabs, calling them &rag heads,8 while commenting on oil prices during a speech to MEDA last month. Burns wrote: "I used a term pertaining to Arabs that I should not have used and which is widely considered offensive. I am writing to you to apologize to both the Equipment Dealers and to the people of the Radisson Northern Hotel for my use of that word."

NEVADA

On Wednesday, the state Republican Chair John Mason announced that the entire paid committee staff had been laid off. The move is thought to be a power play by Governor Kenny Guinn (R) to make the party more accountable to him. The state party currently has a \$220,000 debt from costs related to the race between Senator Harry Reid (D) and former Rep. John Ensign (R) last fall.

NEW YORK

On Saturday, Rep. Rick Lazio (R) said that he won't necessarily step aside for Mayor Rudy Giuliani (R) if, as expected, Mayor Giuliani decides to run for U.S. Senate. Rep. Lazio has not announced his candidacy but has been meeting with GOP leaders from across the state.

On Monday, state Senator Patricia McGee (R) introduced a bill in the New York state Senate that could block the First Lady from running for U.S. Senate from New York. The bill, which would establish residency requirements, stands almost no chance of becoming law since Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver (D) is a strong ally of the First Lady.

A Marist Institute poll of 571 New York City residents conducted February 28 through March 1 showed that 50% of residents believe that Mayor Giuliani is doing an excellent or good job as Mayor, while 49% rated his performance as fair or poor.

PENNSYLVANIA

On Wednesday, I met with Rep. Ron Klink (D) to discuss his campaign for the U.S. Senate. Rep. Klink wanted to make sure that the lines of communication between he and the White House were strong as he prepared to challenge Senator Rick Santorum (R). Rep. Klink also wanted to make sure the White House would stay neutral in the Democratic primary.

VERMONT

On Monday, Auditor Ed Flanagan (D) filed papers to launch his bid to challenge Senator Jim Jeffords (R) for the Senate next year. Flanagan, who is openly gay, intends to tap a national fundraising base of gay and lesbian donors. Other potential candidates include Rep. Bernie Sanders (I), state Senate President Pro Tem Peter Shumlin (D), state Senator and '94 Senate nominee Jan Backus (D), and state Senator Elizabeth Ready (D).

VIRGINIA

A Public Opinion Strategies (R) poll of 500 registered voters conducted February 22-23 showed former Governor George Allen (R) leading Senator Chuck Robb (D) in a general election matchup.

WASHINGTON

This week, U.S. Term Limits began running national television and radio ads chastising Rep. George Nethercutt (R) for reconsidering his term limit pledge. Nethercutt, who defeated then Speaker of the House Tom Foley (D), said during the 1994 election, "The state is not dependent on one man," as he pledged to serve no longer than three terms. With his self-imposed limit expiring in 2000, Nethercutt has sent trial balloons to gauge the district's reaction and possibly ease out of his pledge. U.S. Term Limits is committed to keeping the heat on him through the ad campaign, including through the use of a billboard in Nethercutt's district with states, "Thanks for keeping your word!"

An Evans-McDounough (D) poll conducted on March 4-9 tested Senator Slade Gorton against potential Democratic challengers for Senate next year, including Rep. Jim McDermott, Attorney General Christine Gregoire, Insurance Commissioner Deborah Senn, and King County Executive and +94 nominee Ron Sims:

The poll also showed the President,s approval rating at 54%, and Governor Gary Locke,s (D) approval at 65%.

WHITE HOUSE 2000

On Monday, DNC General Chair Governor Roy Romer and DNC National Chair-Designate Joe Andrew will announce that Los Angeles will host the Democratic convention next year. The announcement will be made in a press conference with Governor Gray Davis (D) and Mayor Richard Riordan (R) in Los Angeles.

On Tuesday, Lamar Alexander (R) officially declared his candidacy for President in Nashville. Alexander is considered a formidable candidate due to his strong organizations in Iowa and New Hampshire, as well as his relatively defined agenda to improve schools, family incomes and national security issues, compared with other Republican candidates, including Governor George W. Bush and Elizabeth Dole, who have avoided most national issues.

On Wednesday, Dole officially launched her exploratory committee in Iowa and launched a TV ad in both Iowa and New Hampshire. The ad features Dole discussing the reasons why she would run for president and highlights her experience serving under five presidents.

Steve Forbes (R) is expected to launch his second presidential campaign next Tuesday and Wednesday in New Hampshire. Forbes has indicated that he will campaign most aggressively in Iowa, New Hampshire, Alaska, and Arizona.

Former Vice President Dan Quayle (R) picked up an endorsement on Monday from Michigan Senator Spence Abraham (R). Michigan Governor John Engler (R) previously announced his support for George W. Bush (R).

On Thursday, Bill Bradley (D) was in Austin, Texas, to attend a fundraising event for his bid for president. Local reports in Austin highlighted that the event drew &some well-known Texas Democrats,8 including former Rep. Jake Pickle, former state Chair Mary Beth Malcolm, and former State Comptroller John Sharp. They all noted, however, that their attendance was not a signal of their endorsement for Bradley over the Vice President, but merely a courtesy visit that they also would pay the Vice President on his visit. The Vice President is planning to travel to Texas in May. ---Wasn,t sure if I should put this graph in. Please advise...

On Tuesday, FEC official Darryl Wold told a House subcommittee that the

matching funds account may face a severe shortfall next year, and may leave candidates waiting for matching funds for perhaps a year or more. Wold projects that the fund will provide for only 40 percent or less of the eligible funds that candidates competing for their party's nomination will be entitled to receive in January. He cited several reasons for the shortfall, saying that while payments to candidates have increased with inflation, contributions from taxpayers have remained flat for several years. He also noted that there has been little promotion of the tax check-off in recent years. In 1996, only 13% of taxpayers checked the box, less than half the number who contributed during the 1980s.

FAR RIGHT

Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott (R) announced last Friday that he will not support a resolution sponsored by Reps. James Clyburn (D-SC) and Robert Wexler (D-FL) condemning the controversial Council of Conservative Citizens (CCC). Although Lott has previously condemned the racist views of the group, he has come under scrutiny for speaking at a number of CCC events. Lott stated that he does not support the resolution because it singles out one organization rather than condemning any organization that advocates white supremacy. Both Clyburn and Wexler have cited Lott's 1994 vote to denounce an anti-Semitic and anti-Catholic speech by Nation of Islam Leader Louis Farrakhan, and argue that Lott's unwillingness to condemn the CCC is purely hypocritical.

Local reports in Missouri this week indicated that some area Democrats, including House Minority Leader Dick Gephardt, had contact with the St. Louis-based Council in the early 1980s. Gephardt is one of many local officials who may have dropped by a CCC gathering in St. Louis. When Gephardt ran for President in 1988, he condemned the group's views and added that he did not recall his visit.

On Thursday, Pat Robertson (R) announced that the Christian Coalition is launching a \$21 million fundraising drive to finance a voter education effort designed to mobilize 15 million religious conservative voters for next year's elections. In his announcement, Robertson emphasized that the Coalition is &far from quitting,& despite recent talk in the press that conservatives are ready to withdraw from the democratic process.

DNC

Next Thursday through Saturday, the DNC will host its annual spring meeting in Washington, D.C. During the general session on Saturday, DNC members will formally elect the new leadership team of Governor Roy Romer, Joe Andrew, Rep. Loretta Sanchez, Mayor Dennis Archer, Andy Tobias, and Beth Dozoretz. The Resolutions Committee will meet to approve several resolutions supporting Census sampling, Mexico re-certification, and the Administration's families and seniors agenda. White House staff will be involved in various caucus meetings on Friday during which the Gay and Lesbian Caucus will vote to formally become a DNC caucus. On Friday, the President and Vice President will host a reception at the White House for DNC members and officers of the DSCC, DCCC, DLCC and DGA. The reception will provide an opportunity for the President and Vice President to thank DNC members, particularly outgoing DNC National Chair Steve Grossman, as well as outgoing officers Carol Pensky and Len Barrack, and to welcome the new leadership. This reception will be followed by an event at the Hyatt hosted by Joe Andrew to salute DNC members.

GENERAL OUTREACH/ACTIVITIES

On Wednesday, I convened a meeting with leaders from the Democratic committees, including the DGA, DSCC, DCCC, and DLCC. Steve Ricchetti and I plan to continue to meet with the group on a bi-weekly basis to coordinate overlapping targets, message, and travel schedules. The meetings also will provide an opportunity to discuss issues in preparation for next year's redistricting battles.

WEEK AHEAD

On Tuesday, the President will travel to Florida for DNC events in Stuart and Manalapan.

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NEW YORK

A Zogby International poll conducted March 10-12 showed Mayor Giuliani (R) leading the First Lady 48%-37% in a hypothetical U.S. Senate race. The Mayor led 47%-39% in a January Zogby poll.

The Mayor received some bad news in a New York Times poll conducted March 8-14, which showed that 43% of New York City residents believe that police brutality against members of minority groups is widespread. The poll also gave Giuliani a 42% job approval rating, the lowest of his tenure, and that 60% believe Giuliani's response to the Diallo shooting has only made matters worse.

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On Tuesday, former City Councilor Happy Fernandez (D) challenged mayoral rival Marty Weinberg's (D) residency status. Fernandez claims that Weinberg has not been a Philadelphia resident for the three years needed to qualify as a mayoral candidate. Weinberg owns a home outside the City, but claims a Philadelphia condominium as his primary residence. For a third consecutive week, Weinberg was the only candidate running television ads.

School Vouchers Q&A

April 2, 1999

Q: An article in USA Today is predicting that Florida is about to pass the first statewide program offering vouchers for private school tuition to students whose public schools fail to meet state standards. Does the President support this policy?

A: We need to focus our attention and resources on strengthening the public schools that serve nearly 90% of students --and especially on fixing failing public schools. Vouchers siphon critical dollars from neighborhood public schools that are already short on resources in order to send a few selected students to private schools. The President thinks that rather than abandon public schools, we should improve them. That is why he is sending legislation to Congress with tough accountability provisions that will require states to identify failing schools and take the tough measures necessary to redesign them, by putting in place high standards, quality teachers, and safe learning environments.

Q: Apparently, the Florida legislation also includes some of the kinds of steps called for by the president --including ending social promotion, tougher accountability, etc. Why aren't you supporting this overall package?

A: We are always pleased when states move in the general direction proposed by the President --such as by ending social promotion and tackling the challenge of fixing failing schools. But we think vouchers undermine these important reforms by diverting resources from public schools into private ones that cannot serve more than a small fraction of our students.

Legislation on Amish Child Labor
April 2, 1999

Q: Do you support the legislation to waive child labor law protections for Amish teenagers?

A: We have deep respect for the cultural and religious traditions of the Amish community and understand the well-intentioned efforts of the bill's sponsors to accommodate these traditions.

However, we do have serious concerns that these bills could: (1) expose young workers to dangerous workplace conditions at sawmills and in the wood processing industry which has a fatality rate five times higher than average for all private-industry; and (2) run afoul of the Establishment Clause of the First Amendment.

Q: Will you veto this legislation?

A: We have serious concerns about this legislation and are working with its sponsors. Secretary Herman will accompany Senator Specter to a sawmill in Amish country later this spring to inspect workplace conditions there.

[**Background:** The Amish Youth Employment Bill passed the House on a voice vote last month, and Senator Specter plans to introduce a similar version of the bill in the Senate. He has warned the Labor Department make administrative changes to the law or he will press very hard for it.]

NATO Summit
April 1, 1999
